## The Caretaker Explains

Editor World: Re letter from "Bather" in this morning's edition of your paper. It is only fair to us as caretakers of the free bathing station at Sunnyside to state that the station is "free" despite its use of the question mark. Here is the way the place is run. If you have your own clothes, there is shelter provided for dressing, and to hang your clothing under, without cost. But if you are fastidious as to dressing in public, there are lockers provided at a cost of 5 cents per key, and we have known as many as ten men and boys to use one locker at once. Suits and towels, which are my own personal property, and not owned by the city as "Bather" infers, are also provided at 5 cents for towels. These being paid for out of our own pocket, may we not charge what we please so that the charges are not excessive? Especially as the gentlemen bathers, and ladies also, seem to think they are privileged to take the costumes, towels, and keys home with them as "souvenirs." And we have been offered anything we should like to charge for accommodation on Sundays, but have always refused. Actually the patrons of this place, old and young, have collected as near as can be computed, six dozen costumes this season, many being used but once.

We did not see the letter referred to, by "Bather," which probably appeared in Monday's issue, but from the statements of our friends we are led to believe the writer was laboring under the impression that the "Roncesvalles Bathing Beach" and the Sunnyside free swimming station were one and the same. Apparently he was a disgruntled patron of the "Roncesvalles Bathing Beach" and did not stop to consider that that place being under control of one well beloved of the people, whose prices not being set by the city, could be whatever he chose to make them. Some come here and because the rules do not accord with their ideas of a "free" swimming station, or because we have to call on them repeatedly to stand by the simple rules necessary to the reputation of the place, go away feeling that we are depriving them of their right as free (?) men.

Let us state that we think there is no other place about the city with the advantage of this place. A fine, clean, sandy bottom, no shelves, no holes, a gentle slope, electric light, shelters, lockers (tho totally insufficient for the thousands of patrons), and a diving float, and spring board for the boys. Mothers, hundreds of them send their little ones here in the full assurance that they will be well cared for. There has not been a drowning accident here in our four years' existence, cursing or foul language is not allowed, and is always severely checked; even smoking is not allowed in the day time, tho we do indulge the men to that extent in the evening. We do not allow indiscriminate mixed bathing, and herein is one of our worst troubles; men think they can go and do as they please in spite of rules. We are open at 7 a.m. We are not open on Sundays at all.

In conclusion, we think it would repay the newspapers and others to investigate for themselves here, forming an opinion of the merits of the complaints published.

### BOIL WATER AT JUNCTION FOR HEALTH OF THE TOWN

Big Machinery Being Made at the Dodge Works—Child Loses One Eye.

Toronto Junction, Aug. 9.—(Special.)—Some immense machinery is being made here, nothing like it ever having been turned out in Canada before. On the suggestion of Councilor Hain a World reporter visited the works of the Dodge Manufacturing Co. on Pelham-avenue, where a range of special engineering work is being carried on.

Shand pointed to a massive iron grooved wheel just being finished for the British Columbia Copper Co. This wheel is 20 feet in diameter, 40 inches across the face, and is grooved with a number of spokes. It is complete, and the interesting work was a series of large steel screws, which the company have been making for some time.

These screws are 32 feet long, 9 inches in diameter, with a thread of seven-eighths of an inch and a three-quarter inch pitch. The large wheel and the screws are the biggest work of the kind ever done in Canada.
