



## TWO STARTED IN FEATURE RACE, FAVORITE, BEAT WES

Four Favorites in Front at Jamaica  
—Latonia Results—The  
Saturday Card.

New York, Oct. 26.—Rye, the 13 to 20 favorite, won the Garden City Stakes, 1 1/4 miles, at Jamaica today, defeating Wes, the only other starter, by five lengths. Wes took the lead in the first quarter and led to the stretch, where Miller brought Rye up and won easily.

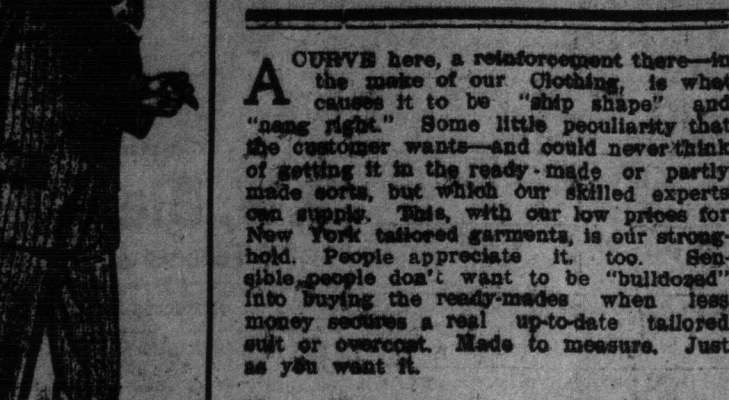
America's Cup Race in 1908.
