SMALLPOX AT STRATFORD.

Boarder in Ill and Seven Railway Men Quarantined.

STRATFORD, Oct. 6.—A serious smallpox outbreak was discovered today in a boarding-house conducted by Mrs. Appell, 455 Ontario-street. The patient is Henry Footwinker. Seven boarders, nearly all employes on the C.T.R., and Mrs. Appell, are quarantined. A hut has been erected on the bank of the river, in remote spot, where the patient will be removed in the morning. This is the second smallpox outbreak since spring.

STRIKE ON SILVER LEAF.

COBALT, Oct. 6.—(Special)—Cobalt camp was all excitement yesterday, when it was reported that a big strike had been made Friday afternoon on the Silver Leaf property. Numbers of interested citizens walked out to the property to-day and found a vein four feet wide, in which there was a mineralized streak eight inches in diameter and heavily shot with silver. The vein was uncovered for 12 feet, but since the discovery, has been covered again. It was while prospecting strings that the find was made, and the management are of the opinion that the vein will join the one discovered last spring. No assays have yet been made.

He was taken to the cells at No. 3 police station and will come before the magistrates Monday morning. Both are race-track followers and strangers to the city.
