## DEATH OF GEO. GIBB.

At the meeting of the Toronto Typographical Union, No. 91, on Saturday night the following resolution was passed: "That, whereas, the late George Gibb, a member of our union, died on Saturday, October 6, 1901, at his residence, 111 St. George Street, and his death has been brought most forcibly to our attention that in this, the Queen City of the Dominion, the city of churches and charities, and institutions wherein the lame, the mentally deficient, the diseased and the fever-stricken may find shelter and comfort—there is not one non-sectarian institution wherein a person suffering from pulmonary trouble may receive that rest and attention which is so freely accorded the sufferer from the most virulent and infectious diseases. And, whereas, after having been denied admittance to various institutions for relief of the sick and distressed, our late brother was given shelter and attendance by the authorities connected with the House of Providence in Toronto; Therefore, be it resolved, that Toronto Typographical Union, No. 91, take this opportunity of expressing its thanks to the Reverend Dr. Treacy for assistance rendered, and for placing upon record its profound appreciation of the feeling of true Christian fellowship, which prompted the Lady Superior and her authorities to take the House of Providence to open the doors of that institution and extend to our late brother medical attendance and nursing and the privilege of a shelter in which to lie down and die.

And, be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution, signed by the proper officers, and attested by the seal of Toronto Typographical Union, No. 91, be handed to the Reverend Dr. Treacy, with the request that he forward it to the proper authorities.

## EXTIRPATE ANARCHISTS.

London, Oct. 7.—The speech of H. Kelly of New York at the Anarchist meeting held in a hall in the Tottenham Court Road, London, last night, was denounced by the late President McKinley's political career, has led to a revival of the demand for the extirpation of Anarchism. The Fall Mists Gazette this afternoon compares Anarchism with Pantheism, maintains that the difference between the two is that of Anarchism and the war of outrage advocated by such men as former Congressmen Henry and George, and that of Pantheism means to the same end, and that the police of the two Anarchist nations have endeavored to take concerted action to hunt down the social enemy wherever Anarchist or Pantheist and both governments refuse them the right of asylum. By a coincidence, The Times this morning prints a long article from Washington protesting against the license allowed the Irish in America in plotting against Great Britain. Commenting on this, The St. James Gazette thinks British hands are not altogether clean and that no law would be sustained if Kelly and other foreigners whose cult is murder received immediate notice to quit.

## AT OSOODE HALL.

The Divisional Court yesterday granted an order calling upon J. A. Mackie, J.P., of Waterloo to show cause why his conviction of Henry B. Duering in August last should not be set aside. Duering was fined on the information of one Schott for that he had run down and killed some of the latter's sheep. The dogs, two in number, were ordered to be shot, but this has not yet been done. The main ground upon which the application was made was that the Justice of the Peace usurped the functions of the Waterloo Police Magistrate.

The Divisional Court will today hear the appeal of the Township of York from a \$200 verdict, obtained by Fred Summers for the loss of a team of horses out of Yonge-street.

## RETURNS RICH AFTER 21 YEARS.

Middleton, N.Y., Oct. 7.—Twenty-one years ago last June Cephas S. Wetmore left his little farm near Avon, saying he was going to walk over the mountain to Ellenville. He disappeared. His wife was left with three young children and had a hard struggle to keep her home. Last Thursday Wetmore returned to his family. He had amassed wealth, and his welcome was correspondingly hearty. According to his story, he had been in every State in the Union, and in Mexico and South America.

## NINETEEN DROWNED.

Lisbon, Oct. 7.—Nineteen persons lost their lives today owing to the foundering of a fishing boat in the Bay of Peniche.

### Died in the Hospital.

The many young friends of John D. Simkins will regret to learn of his death, which occurred on Sunday morning in the Notre Dame Hospital at Montreal, after only a week's illness. Mr. Simkins was taken ill with appendicitis, and an operation was performed, but only temporary relief was gained.

### Police Court Record.

William Maxwell, who broke into Henry Goodman's manufactory and stole a pair of pants, was sent to Kingston Penitentiary for two years by Judge Magistrate Denison yesterday. For stealing jewelry from the house of his sister, Mrs. Joseph of Seward Street, Kingston, he was given nine months. The case in which Mrs. Wiseman was charged with selling liquor without a license was dismissed. Ten alleged gamblers, whose prosecution depended on the case against Samuel MacFarlane, were discharged. Harry May will be tried on Oct. 14 on a charge of attempting to break into Arnold's store, 295 Young-street. William and Elizabeth Wright, charged with keeping an improper house on Wilton-avenue, were remanded till Oct. 10.

### Precedence at Reception.

The following adjustment of the precedence at the reception in the Parliament Buildings on Friday evening has been decided upon by the speaker, the members of the House of Commons and the Legislature, and judges of the High Court and the county courts, with their wives and daughters, and shall wait in the Council Chamber until the royal visitors are prepared to receive them. They should be ready at least fifteen minutes before 9 o'clock—the regular time announced for the reception. In all respects, as far as practicable, the precedence at Toronto will follow the rule laid down at the Ottawa reception.

### Marriage—Holt.

The marriage took place in Montreal on Saturday of William Morrice, son of the late Captain Morrice, and Miss Florence Holt of Bethel, Maine. The ceremony was performed in Knox Church, Montreal, by Rev. Mr. Fleck. Miss Nettie Morrice, sister of the groom, was bridesmaid, and Dr. Louis Robertson was best man. After the wedding, a reception was held at the Windsor Hotel. Mr. and Mrs. Morrice will spend their honeymoon in the Western States.

### Funeral Was Private.

The remains of the late Homer Pligie, formerly superintendent of the Ontario Division of the C.P.R. Telegraph Company, were taken to Unionville for interment yesterday afternoon. The funeral, which was held at the residence of the late Mr. Pligie, was private. The remains were interred in St. Philip's burying ground.

Mr. Robert Davies, proprietor of the Don Valley Brick Works, has sent to the Firemen's Benefit Fund the sum of \$50, in recognition of the help rendered to the firemen responded to the call for help during the fire which took place in the Don Valley Brickworks recently.

### 150 Starved to Death.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 7.—Steamer advices say that 150 persons died of starvation in the plague, is now visited by famine. One hundred and thirty-five died from starvation are reported to have occurred at Capiz alone. To prevent the spread of the plague, Manila has inaugurated a war against rats, paying two and a half cents for each rodent delivered to the Board of Health.
