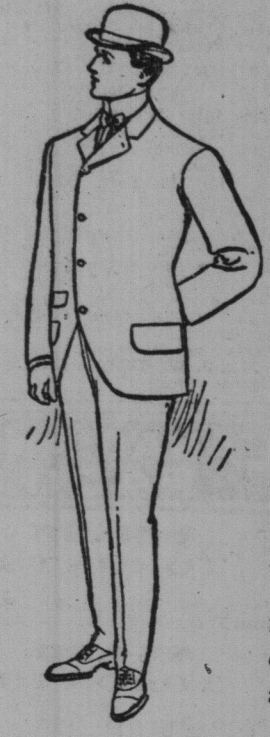

SEEDS BLOWN FROM TRAINS

Demonstrate Capabilities of Soil and Climate of Manitoba.

The advent of transportation facilities in Manitoba has demonstrated in a rather unique way the capabilities of the soil and climate of that province in the production of cereal products. James Hartney, agent for the government of that province in this city, informed The World yesterday that he had just received word from several places in the province of the appearance of clover and other species of grasses along the railway tracks that it was hitherto thought would not grow there. The supposition, of course, for their appearance is that the seed had blown off cars in which clover and grasses had been shipped. Referring in a letter on the subject, one writer says: "The seed of the grass had evidently been scattered by passing trains and found the conditions favorable to propitious growth, as many of the stalks were over three feet in height. Besides the grasses there were found several varieties of tame clover that flourished in full bloom." Mr. Hartney states that the wild plants of the prairie are fast giving place to the Austrian brome and native rye grasses, which have so far shown the best results in the government experimental farm.

Mr. Hartney states that from present indications about an equal number of men as that of last year will be required for the harvest this year.

JERSEYS OF THE HIGHEST CLASS

Recent importations for the Denonia Park Farm, East Toronto.

An important auction sale of Jersey cattle was recently held at Linden Grove, Coopersburg, Pa., when some very valuable animals changed owners. A splendid Jersey bull named Flying Fox brought \$7500. Two female yearlings bred by this noble animal were purchased by J. B. Ketchen, the superintendent of Denonia Park, the experimental farm established by the late W. E. H. Massey at East Toronto, Coleman P.O., as also an elegant son of Flying Fox out of a daughter of Golden Lad.

Denonia Park Farm's purchases also included two cows sired by Nunthorpe and Mon Plaisir respectively, a 2-year-old by John Bull and a heifer sired by Napoleon Bonaparte.

Speaking of the selection, The Jersey Bulletin says: "It goes without saying that they are animals of the highest class."

The Denonia herd already comprises some 150 cattle, including many valuable prize-winning Jerseys, Ayrshires and Guernseys, and the recent importation was obtained for the purpose of further improving the Jersey stock.

Trained Animal Show.
