The "British Workman," and the "Cottager and Artizan" have been regularly distributed every month. Besides these papers the sum of \$30 was expended on new books for the Library—the amount so expended was partly made up by the interest, \$14, on the bequest made to the Library of this School by the late Mr. Jos. Mackay.

Did our finances admit of it, a little money spent upon our floor would not be thrown away. The seams seem to be widening, so that the regions below are too plainly revealed, and the frost and storms of winter are not easily kept out even with a fire in the stove. This would have been remedied last year had not the snow played havoc with our shed roof, and so deprived us of the means. We trust some scheme will be devised this year to enable us to sit without having our feet frozen next winter while the lessons are being studied. The road to and from the school being exposed to the full blast of winter, sheltered, however, to the north-west by the Ottawa Ranges, and to the south-east by the Vermont Hills, is sufficiently cold to create a desire for comfortable quarters during the hour for study.

It gives us much pleasure to inform you that in order to render the present meeting as pleasant and profitable as possible, we have, besides several well tried friends who have always aided us upon these occasions, other friends who have so much interest in our prosperity as to come such a distance to aid us in our meeting, and give us words of cheer and counsel, as well as by their sweet songs to waft us for a while from earth to heaven.
