FOR LESE MAJESTE. Berlin, Jan. 26.-Herr Trojan, editor of the Kladderadatsch, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment in a fortress for lee majeste, in cartooning Emperor William.

THE ALGIERS RIOT. Algiers, Jan. 26.-Chebat, one of the Jews who was stoned, died last evening. His skull was fractured. Some 80 of the rioters were condemned to terms of imprisonment varying from three months to a year, and one who was caught in the act of pillaging was sentenced to five years in prison.

MUST DIE. Philippopolis, Jan. 26.—The appeal of Captain Boitcheff, formerly amp to Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, from the sentence of death passed upon him in July last for the murder of his mistress, Anna Szimon, together with the accompanying appeal of Boitcheff's accomplice, Novelitch, at the time of the murder prefect of police, has been rejected, and the original sentences of death passed upon both have been confirmed.

BANKS. Paris, Jan. 26.—The French Chamber of Deputies yesterday, calmly discussing the war budget, adopted, in spite of objections of Gen. Billot, the mmister of war, a medal commemorative of the war of 1870. The budget committee adopted a motion to embody in the mail contract of the French Trans-Atlantic Company, the prohibition to cross the Newfoundland Banks during the fishing season, but empowering the government to suspend its enforcement until it obtained a similar engagement

A RAP AT CONGRESS. Paris, Jan. 26.-In the course of an interview at Grasse, Cardinal Vaughan, discussing the Anglo-American re-lations, said: "We know exactly what these occasional outbursts of hostility against England are worth, especially at election time. It appears that your better men do not go into politics. As long as that state of things exists, as long as the best men stand aloof, you must never be surprised if the country feels the effects or is dragged into some suicidal policy. It would be the natural result sooner or later. Public men should be of the best, otherwise it must come to a cataclysm. at the Government of England. It is the aristocracy that elevates our politics by taking an active part in af-fairs."

CABLE NOTES

Dispatch of the U. S. Battleship The Afridis' Probable Source of Maine to Havana

es Material for the Sensation. Mongers to Work On.

Havana, Jan. 26.—The United States battleship Maine, commanded by Charles D. Sigsbee, which left Key West, Florida, on Jan. 24, arrived here yesterday morning and was saluted by the forts and war vessels. A report is current that the United States consul, Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, and Dr. Congosta, secretary-general of the government, have had a slight misun-

derstanding.
Madrid, Jan. 26.—Admiral Chacon, the admiral of the fleet, arrived here and had a long conference with Admiral Bermejo, the minister of marine. He asserted that the recent evolutions had demonstrated the perfect condition of the fleet. The Epoca asks if the dispatch of the Maine to Havana is "intended as a sop to the jingoes," and adds: "We cannot suppose the American government so naive or badly informed as to imagine that the presence of American war vessels at Havana will be a cause of satisfaction to Spain or an indication of friendship." New York, Jan. 26 .- A Madrid dis-

patch to the World says: "The official intimation of the contemplated visit of American vessels of war to Havana and the presence of an American squadron in the West Indian waters has caused a sensation and much displeasure at Madrid, which the press of all shades of opinion echo today with much bitterness. El Imparcial calls the "conduct of America provocation without Justification," and recommends Spaniards in Havana to be prudent and self-possessed, and to show disdain and indifference during the stay of American vessels.

Sagasta says the Spanish government attaches no importance to the movements of the American ships, as it is perfectly aware that President Mc-Kinley harbors no designs against the present cordial relations between the two countries. It is easy to see, however, he says, how politicians and military men apprehend any demonstration by the old Spanish party in Havana on the occasion of a visit by an American vessel. That would find an echo in the patriotic feelings and hardly suppressed irritation against the United States in Spain.
