ATROCIOUS MURDER NEAR CITY Roads Piled High With Beautiful WOMAN SLASHED TO DEATH

Mrs. James Hartwick, of Cobble Hill, West Nissouri, Found Murdered in Her Bed.

HUSBAND, THOUGHT TO BE INSANE, IS ARRESTED

James Hartwick, an old and hitherto highly esteemed resident of Cobble Hill, a little village three miles from Thorndale, was brought to this city last night on the midnight train, and lodged in the county jail, where he will wait his trial on a charge of murder. The crime was a most atrocious one, and is believed to have been perpetrated on Sunday morning, probably shortly after breakfast. The first intimation that anything was wrong occurred about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, when, according to the story told to the constables by Mr. Hugh Day, a farmer, living near the Hartwicks, Mr. Hartwick came to their place only partly dressed, and without any boots. He was known to be somewhat eccentric, but it was apparent from the way that he was acting that he was crazy. Notwithstanding that Hartwick was very much excited, and occasionally broke into incoherent cries, it was seen that he was suffering very much from the cold, and he was taken into Mr. Day's house.

APPEARED GREATLY AGITATED ..

While he was waiting Hartwick appeared to be greatly agitated and would give no answer when asked questions. If was thought at the time that he was drunk, as he had been known to become greatly excited and do strange things when under the influence of liquor. Someone said they would take him home and put him to bed, and this remark excited Hartwick greatly and he screamed. Becoming quieter he said he could not go into his bedroom. When asked the reason he said there was blood there, and that he was afraid. Mr. Day began to suspect that there was some other cause for the man's strange conduct than that of drink, and advised him once more to go to his home, which Hartwick finally did. After talking the matter over with the family it was decided to notify the county police. County Constable Faircloth was notified, and proceeded at once to the home of the Hartwicks. The old man had evidently seen him coming, and when he knocked, refused to answer. It was not until it became plain that the constable, if not admitted, would break in, that Hartwick came to the door and told the constable and his companion to go away, that he had done nothing, and would not let them in. The constable, thereupon, prepared to force his way and Hartwick ceased his opposition. The bedroom door was locked, and for a few minutes Hartwick refused to open it, but finally did so. Constable Faircloth and his companion entered, while Hartwick went to the window to raised the blind.

A SCENE OF HORROR.

As soon as the light was admitted he commenced laughing hysterically while the constable and his companion gazed with horror at the bed on which Mrs. Hartwick lay practically nude, and with a number of deep gashes in her side and abdomen. It was evident that the woman had been dead ed and handcuffed, as he was becoming wildly excited, and it was feared that he might do some harm. He said nothing until he had left the house and then in an incoherent and disjointed way related enough of the story for the officers to understand that he and his wife had quarreled and that he had made away with her.

STRUGGLES TO ESCAPE.

The recital seemed to render Hartwick a maniac again, and he struggled wildly to escape. He was placed in Thorndale jail yesterday, and brought to this city late last night. Hartwick was much agitated at times, and during the night frequently broke into fits of screaming.

BRINGING BODY FOR INQUEST.

High Constable Hughes left with Constable Faircloth this morning to bring the body of Mrs. Hartwick to the city, where an inquest will be

The Hartwicks moved to Cobble Hill about five years ago from Delaware where they were well known. Previous to that that they lived at Kilworth. A resident of Kilworth, in speaking to The Advertiser this morning, said: "Hartwick was not thought particularly well of in the neighborhood on account of his morose disposition and drinking habits. He was known in Delaware as a very heavy drinker, and the straitened circumstances in which the family usually found themselves were attributed to this weakness of his. Mrs. Hartwick, on the other hand, was a most industrious. hard-working woman, and the neighbors felt much pity for her on account of the rough treatment which she received from her husband. Hartwick when drunk was particularly brutal, it is said, and it is alleged has often driven the family from home at nights when he would come back from the

Hartwick is about 60 years old, and is a tall, thin man, with keen eyes which, when the fits of excitement come over him, light up with a most sinister expression. His condition at present is a terrifying one, and his general appearance is that of a maniac.

REFUSES TO TALK.

Since his incarceration Hartwick has refused absolutely to talk, and the jail authorities today stated that he has every appearance of being a maniac. The only word he has spoken since being arrested was when an attendant asked him several times if he wanted a drink, and he shouted "No!" at the top of his voice.

Hartwick spends his time crouched in a corner and glaring about his cell. When an attempt was made last night to take his pedigree he closed his eves and became sullen.

At times, too, he shivers, as if recalling his awful crime. Hartwick has created no disturbance at the jail beyond emitting an occasional shriek.

Judging by his appearance Hartwick did not accomplish his deed without a terrific struggle, for he is a mass of cuts and bruises. His hands, especially, show signs of rough usage, and are covered with lumps and cuts.
