EVERY BOY SHOULD BOX, SAYS REV. BILLY SUNDAY

Evangelist Puts O. K. On Ring Pastime.

NEW YORK, April 14.—The Rev. Billy Sunday, the evangelist, is a boxing fan as well as a baseball enthusiast. Talking on the ring game, recently, he said: "Nothing wrong with boxing. It is properly regulated, is not harmful, and does a certain amount of good. Certainly it won't corrupt anyone's morals for the reason that it is a clean sport. There can't be any harm as long as they don't slug with the bare knuckles, as in the old days," added Sunday. "Boxing makes a fellow courageous, makes him self-dependent. The boy or man who can box isn't afraid. He knows he can protect himself, and you never find that sort of fellow seeking trouble. Fiat Beats a Gun. 'Every boy should be taught to box. Every exercise, I want my boy to be able to box and protect himself. You never hear of a good boxer going around with a gun in his pocket, do you? No, you don't! I believe in universal sports, just as I believe in universal peace. Good things for the nation at large. Makes boys and men strong of body and mind. That's why we want strong men, not weak old fossils. Athletics keep you in good health. That's the main thing. 'And concluded Sunday, with a wink, I don't mind telling you that I can handle my own dukes pretty well. In my younger days I was somewhat of a boxer myself, and I haven't forgotten how."

The injury may keep Baker out of the game for a month.

MORAN TO FIGHT CARL MORRIS NEXT

NEW YORK, April 14.—Frank Moran landed back in the flite spotlight today with both feet, and made Carl Morris move over. The big Pittsburgher massaged the classic jaw of Tom Cowler, knocked out the "man mountain" in four rounds, and winning the chance to meet Morris in a ten-round bout, which will be staged here within three weeks. Moran has not enjoyed much publicity in flite circles since he met Jess Willard here, but today he is back again because boxing fans are convinced he still carries a knockout punch. They want to see what he can do to Morris.

GREEN JONES LOOKS CLASS OF KENTUCKY DERBY SPEED HORSES

Biggest Colt in Training Is Making Fast Time.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 14.—Among the busiest places in Kentucky with the possible exception of the army and navy recruiting offices, are the race tracks. From dawn until dusk eligibles are training here for the Kentucky derby, the \$20,000 racing classic for three-year-olds, to be decided at Churchill Downs on May 12. Training has progressed sufficiently to permit the candidates being given trials of a mile. Green Jones, which negotiated the distance in 1:45 2-5, the fastest to date, galloped the last eighth of a mile in 15 seconds. Green Jones, over 15 hands 2 inches high, is the biggest derby colt in local training. North Star III, the imported Sun Star colt, pulled a strong K. M. number is reported to have paid \$50,000 as a two-year-old, was a recent arrival at Falmouth Park, Charleston, S.C. He is the probable favorite for the event and is counted upon as a sure starter by Star Master from the same stable.

Whitney Expected.

Other large racing establishments expected soon include those of Billings & Johnson, Harry Payne, Whitney, Grant Hugh Brown and W. H. Cope. J. W. Schorr's Harry Kelly appears to be able to run fast and far. He is to be sent to Lexington with Cuddeh, Penrod and the other eligibles in the Schorr stable for a race or two prior to the derby.

The most advanced eligible so far is apparently Omar Khayyam, from the stable of Billings & Johnson. Reports from Hot Springs state he went the full derby distance, a mile and an eighth, in 2:09 3-5, eased up, and carried the weight he will be asked to back in the big race.

No sickness or mishap among the candidates in training has been reported. As the race is a month off it is considered remarkable that none of the 76 nominations has been withdrawn.

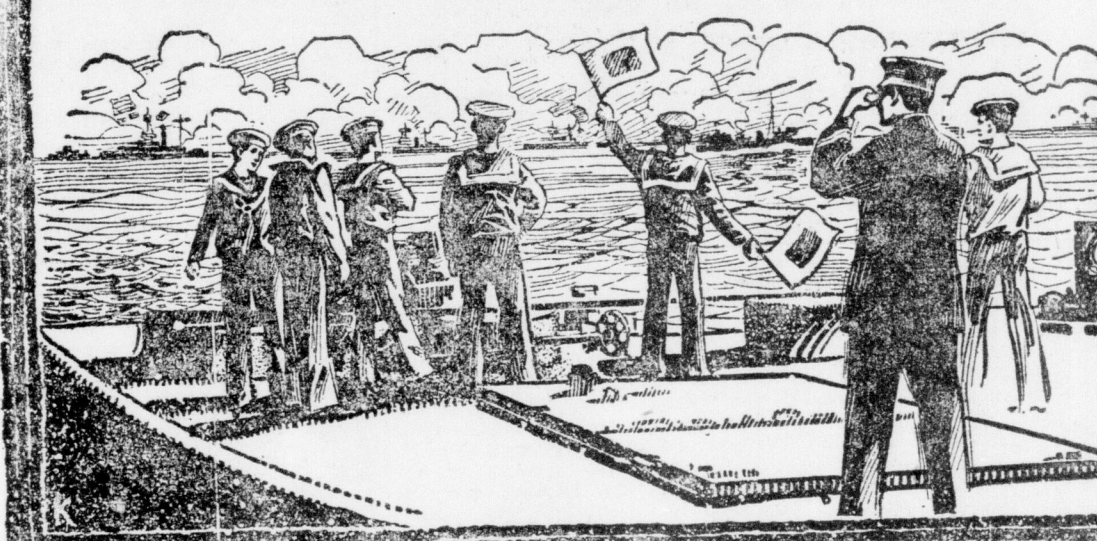
