

DELEGATES DECLINE TO HEAR WATTERS ON CLOSED QUESTION

Ex-President Not Given a Chance To Explain His Side of Controversy.

STORMY SCENE FOLLOWS

Chairman of Committee Declares Peace Conference Report Carried.

Hamilton, Sept. 26.—A storm of brief duration broke almost immediately upon the resumption of business by the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress this morning. Ex-President J C. Watters attempted to explain his side of the controversy regarding representation on the international peace conference.

J. W. Wilkinson, chairman of the committee on officers' reports, took exception, declaring that the report embodying the statement concerning the conference had been carried.

Mr. Watters urged that he be allowed to explain his position, but no motion requesting re-consideration was forthcoming.

"It's an absolute crime that Mr. Watters is not heard," cried on delegate.
"Sit down, sit down!" retorted a number of others.

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A pandemonium followed, and it was some time before President Moore could obtain order.

Owing to the inclusion in the report of the British Columbia Federation of Labor to the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress of resolutions recommending industrial organization of the workers and principles of the one big union movement, the committee recommended reference to the committee on constitution and law. The recommendation was adopt.

Declaring that the necessity for making the office of secretary-treasurer a permanent one is not as acute at this time as it was a few years ago, the committee on legislation and law recommended non-concurrence in resolutions submitted by Toronto machinists and the Moose Jaw Trades and Labor Council demanding that the holder of this office devote the whole of his time to the work and requesting that the salary be materially increased.

Delegate Ball, Calgary, supported the resolution, and he was followed by Delegate Malvilieu, Toronto, who claimed that the present system is un-

laimed that the present system is un the vote on the committee's re-On the vote on the committee's report of non-concurrence being taken, President Moore expressed doubt, but his decision was greeted with groans from a number of delegates, who were of the opinion that the assembly had voted against the committee's recommendation

During an interval Secretary-Treasurer Draper explained his position, declaring that he was not lookink for any sympathy from the delegates, or "sob stuff." It was their business what they did. 

BOARD OF COMMERCE TO HEAR EVIDENCE

REGARDING PACKERS

Toronto, Sept. 26.—Evidence of the connection of "Canadian Packers, Limited," with the allied packing interests of the United States will be presented to the board of commerce, inquiring into the high cost of living, according to the statement of W. H. Price, K.C. Ontario Government counsel, when the board resumed its sessions here today.

For the first time in this city Judge Robson, chairman of the board, sat with W. F. O'Connor, K.C., the vice-chairman, and the presumption is that the board expects to hear something highly important at this session.
