Yankees Again Take Count From Boston—The Phillies Couldn't Catch Up To Nationals.

CLEVELAND, April 20.—Cleveland defeated Detroit, 11 to 10, today in a game that lasted more than three hours. Each team used five pitchers, who, probably because of the cold weather, neither had control nor effectiveness. There were eighteen passes issued. Detroit scored five runs in the eighth inning on six bases on balls and only one hit. Detroit had the bases filled in the ninth, when Dale replaced Morton and pitched to one batsman, Young, who grounded and was thrown out.

BOSTON'S FIFTH WIN. BOSTON, April 20.—Boston won its fifth straight game today, getting two runs in the ninth off St. Louis, defeating New York, 3 to 2. 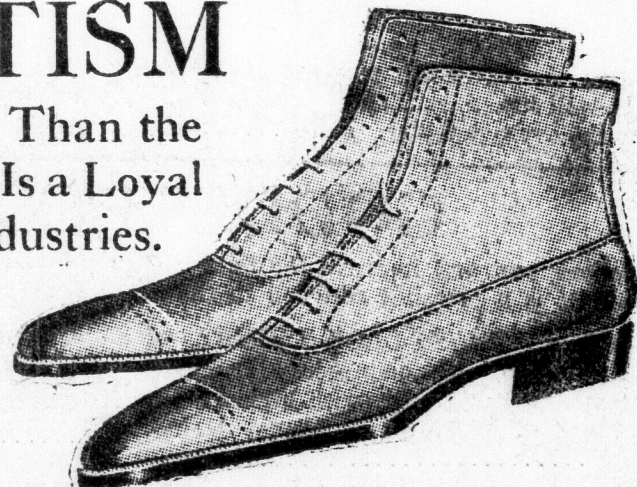
