

237 NOMINATIONS IN FOR THE WINDSOR JOCKEY CLUB STAKES

Harry Payne Whitney's Stable Will Have Seven Entries On Card Opening July 14.

Windsor, June 18.—A total of 237 nominations to the Windsor Jockey Club stakes to be run here next month indicate interest in Canadian turf events has not sagged in spite of the order-in-council ban. For the Ontario Classic, the oldest event at the plant, which has been running for two decades, has attracted 63 entries for the headliner on the opening day, July 14, including seven horses from the stable of Harry Payne Whitney, two of which finished second and fourth in this year's Kentucky Derby.

The other three stakes, the Canadian, Provincial and Essex Handicaps, will be run during the week's racing which terminates the card July 21. Immediately following will be a week of racing at Kenilworth. The value of the Canadian Handicap is \$5,000, and has attracted 28 entries, all of these nominators being Canadians, while the \$5,000 Provincial stakes has 82 entries and the \$5,000 Essex, 59.

Canada Foremost.
Dr. Creelman, who is leaving shortly for England as representative of the Ontario Government, urged the people of Ontario and Canada to get better world trade. Especially in the British Isles, Canada's name stood, he said, foremost, since her great work in the late war, and this country had the greatest chance for exporting to other countries. He advised farmers to write directly to the department for information on all subjects pertaining to agriculture when assistance was needed, and promised to do his utmost in placing sugar, corn and tobacco, the chief crops of this country, along with the best from other parts well before the British public.

\$2,000,000 Business.
Harold Curry of Stratford, U. F. O. director for Middlesex, spoke briefly on the Farmers' Co-operative Society. Last year the concern did an \$8,000,000 business, and is going out for bigger trade. He said that the society had every farmer to subscribe for one share at least, which would give the society a capital of \$2,000,000.

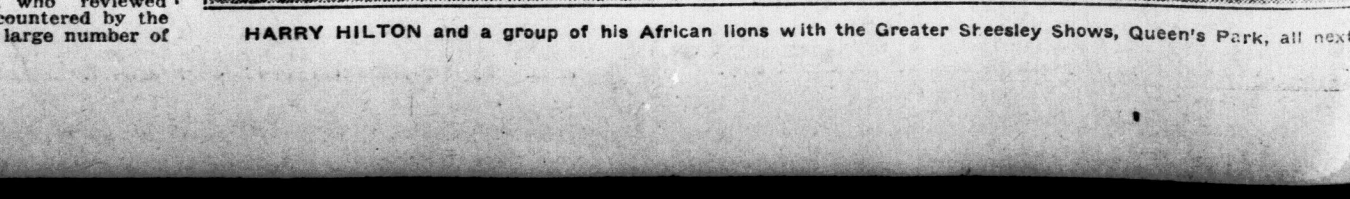
