FATHER GETS WORD FROM MISSING BOY, FREDDIE FINNEGAN

SARNIA, Aug. 9.—Tonight word was received here from St. Clair, Michigan, of receipt of a telegram by Herbert Finnegan, father of the missing boy, Bert Finnegan, of the steamer William L. Siemens, saying "Have letter from Frederick; don't worry." This message seems to account for the missing lad who disappeared just one week ago and who has kept the police of several Ohio cities busy for seven days, as well as officials on this side of the border in an effort to locate him.

Capt. Finnegan wired from the Soo, where he is supposed to be on his way home. When he arrives here tomorrow it is expected that further information may be obtainable. Mrs. Finnegan and son Herbert, who spent last week in Ashtabula, trying to get some trace of the boy, have now returned to their home in St. Clair, Michigan, according to the message received here.

Allied activity on the part of rum-runners who have shifted their scene of activity from the Detroit River to the River St. Clair, resulted in reinforcements arriving here from the provincial department to aid Inspector Lucas and his present staff of officials. The two new inspectors to commence their duties here are inspectors Sylvester and Shippard of Toronto. Local officials here had no statement to make concerning the arrival of the new officers, beyond saying that a lot of the rum-runners' activity was credited to rumors, and that the arrival of new officials would result in the "softening up" of the old staff of officers. The new men started right in to do business with the result that Mike Barnard, a Russian, paid a \$200 court fine and was sent to jail for a week. Police Magistrate, tonight it was stated a number of other arrests were likely to follow that of Barnard's in Sarnia's Little Russia.

INGERSOLL, Aug. 9.—While operating a machine at Evans Brothers' piano factory today, Wellington John, a 25-year-old man, sustained very serious injuries. His left hand was caught in the machine, with the result that all the fingers were amputated.

MURDER CHARGE AGAINST HELMER MAY BE REDUCED

Norfolk County Young Farmer May Face Trial On Manslaughter Count Only.

(By Staff Reporter.)

SIMCOE, Ont., Aug. 9.—The general opinion expressed throughout Norfolk County is that Lorne Helmer, 30-year-old Walsingham Township farmer, held in the county jail here for the murder of James Lorne, will never be convicted by a jury on the capital charge. In fact, many express the view that Helmer will not even be called upon to face trial on a charge of murder, but that this will be reduced to one of manslaughter in the near future and accused will be released on bail until the autumn assizes to be held here in October. W. E. Kelly, K.C., defending Helmer, is understood to be about to attempt proceedings at once to attain this object.

Although the crown officials are reticent regarding anything said by Lorne Helmer since his arrest by Provincial Detective John Miller, it is generally believed throughout the district that the statement made by the young farmer when taken into custody by Miller, in which Helmer admitted that he had killed his brother-in-law, James Lorne, is the only statement he has made since his arrest.

At that time the brother described the circumstances under which James Lorne was killed, and it is on the grounds that no weapon was used

Squire John Abel, Justice of the peace, who committed Lorne Helmer for trial last Friday on a charge of murder, also heard the evidence in the Shoup case, and committed Emerson Shelly for trial on a similar charge. At the inquest into Lorne's death Friday, J. M. Kruze, a brother-in-law of Christian Shoup, acted as a member of the coroner's jury, and one of the chief witnesses against Shelly in the trial of the murder was present. Detective John Miller made the arrest in both cases, and both Shelly and Hel
