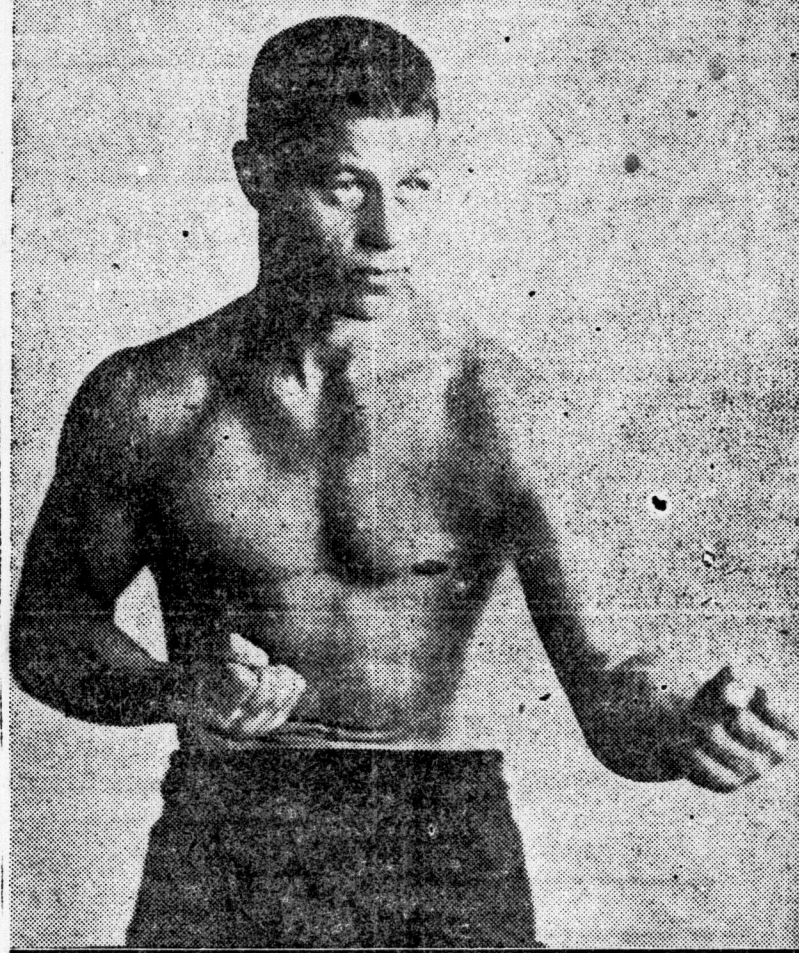

BAN JOHNSON SAYS
JOINT SESSION NOT
TO BE HELD MONDAY

Chicago, Nov. 5.—President Ban Johnson of the American League today intimated that there will be no joint session of the major league club owners in Chicago Monday afternoon.

Johnson's stand was taken by fans to be his reply to the reports from New York that President Heydler of the National League had issued a second invitation to the American League executive and to the "loyal five" club owners support of Johnson to join with the National League and the Chicago, New York and Boston clubs in session here Monday afternoon.

President Johnson yesterday issued a call for a special meeting of all the club owners of the American League to discuss league matters. The session was set for Monday morning in Chicago. It was expected today that discussion will arise at the Monday morning meeting dealing with consideration of plans to reorganize the national commission.

Johnson's forces, consisting of the Cleveland, St. Louis, Detroit, Washington and Philadelphia clubs, while agreed that a change in baseball laws is necessary in the light of the recent scandal exposed by the National League of the Lasker plan of baseball reorganization which calls for a governing body of disinterested parties to succeed the present national commission.

A special meeting of the National League club owners has been called for Monday by President Heydler. The joint meeting Monday afternoon of National and American League club owners and managers will spend Monday in Chicago and Tuesday the storm centre will move to Kansas City, where the National Association meets.

HIGH TEACHERS MUST
TAKE UP MANLY ART

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Before a high school teacher graduates from the faculty of education at the University of Toronto he must, in accordance with the rules of the Ontario department of education, be qualified to teach boxing. This new rule, with which comparatively few appear to be familiar, was pointed out yesterday by Rev. D. B. MacDonald, headmaster of St. Andrew's school, who is one of the officials of the part of the educational authorities as a proof that they are awakening to the importance of boxing in the high schools. There is no doubt as to its value he is firmly convinced, and to hold up his conditions he gives his experiences with the manly art as it is taught at St. Andrew's, the first local school to make boxing a definite part of its physical education. For sixteen years boxing has played a leading part in the physical life of the school, and never, says Mr. MacDonald, has it occasioned any unpleasantness.

It Teaches Tolerance.

"In the hundreds of boys' contests held at St. Andrew's College during the past sixteen years," he said, "not one boy has lost his temper or refused to shake hands after losing, while in the football games a St. Andrew boy is never put off for fighting on the field."

"Boxing has for generations been taught in all the big English schools with the result that it has become the Britishers' recognized method of self-defence, and who is there that does not entertain wholesome respect for this same method?"

"I understand that boxing is compulsory in Australia, New Zealand and in many of the largest cities in the United States, and I do not think that there is an instance where it cannot be proved that there is far less fighting in schools where boxing is taught. St. Andrew's has for years been a member of the Royal Military College and intercollegiate champions which compare very favorably with the record of any other school and this I attribute to their training and development in the boxing classes. Such sportsmen as Montgomery Ross, Paisley, Ralph, Sterrett and Waterous are all graduates of St. Andrew's College."

COMISKEY'S STATEMENT.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 5. Jacob Ruppert and T. L. Huston, owners of the New York club of the American League, last night made public a statement from Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the Chicago Americans, dealing with the 1919 world series scandal. The statement, a reply to a request from the New York owners, seeks to counteract the impression that prevails that Mr. Comiskey had been delinquent in exposing the scandal and that credit should go to President Johnson of the American League for doing so.

Mr. Comiskey declared that the first intimation he received of crookedness in the series was regarding H. C. Redmond of St. Louis, who claimed to have lost \$5,000 on the White Sox by being double-crossed. Redmond was interviewed, said Comiskey, by Manager Gleason and "Tip" O'Neil, but the story he told was so vague and uncertain in character that no one would be justified in taking affirmative action such as would destroy the character and reputation of men, even though they were ball players.

PROPRIETOR OF BRESLAU
HOTEL TO FACE SECOND
CHARGE UNDER O. T. A.

KITCHENER, Nov. 4.—License Inspector Zinkann of this city reports a second raid on the hotel at Breslau, in which, assisted by Inspector Elliott of Stratford and Chief Wilson of Hespeier, he found booze hidden in a sewing machine. The bartender also surrendered a bottle of whiskey which he was carrying on his hip. A Schwartz, the proprietor, will be arraigned on a second offence charge.

Given Their Freedom.

Walter Hauser and William Schaefer, held here on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the motor fatality on Saturday night which resulted in the death of Mrs. Edward Ludwig, were granted their freedom this morning, when the charge against them was withdrawn by the crown attorney. The coroner's jury held them blameless for the accident.

Committed For Trial.

Russell Hahn was formally charged with criminal negligence in police court today and committed for trial by Magistrate Weil in connection with the death of Albert McCruther, who was killed on Saturday night by a motor car driven by Hahn. Hahn was originally charged with manslaughter, but the crown reduced the charge.

As a result of the unusually heavy casualties from motor accidents in the city over last weekend, the local police commission has been requested by the city to provide sufficient policemen to rigidly enforce the city bylaws.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The team of women hockey players from Philadelphia, which recently arrived in England to play women's teams here, was beaten at Wimbledon today in its first match, played with the Surrey ladies' team. The score was 2 to 2.

Ban and Faithfuls Invited
To Discuss Lasker Plan

Purpose of Meeting Is To Draft Committee To Meet Minors Regarding New Government.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Invitations to attend the baseball meeting in Chicago November 8 have been sent to President Ban Johnson of the American League and to heads of the National and American League clubs by President John Heydler of the National League. Heydler was temporary chairman of the previous meeting which approved the plan to place control of baseball in the hands of men not connected with the sport. At this meeting only three American clubs—New York, Chicago and Boston—were represented.

The purpose of the meeting, Heydler has stated, is to appoint a committee to meet a committee selected by the National Association of Major Leagues. This joint committee is to "prepare an agreement embodying such new organic provisions for the maintenance of the national game and to so reorganize the government thereof as to assure the public that the sport is conducted in a proper manner."

JIMMY BURKE OF BROWNS
LET OUT—NO SUCCESSOR

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 4.—Jimmy Burke today was released as manager of the St. Louis American League Baseball Club. No successor was announced. Burke became manager in the middle of the 1918 season, succeeding Fiebert Jones.

MUST MEET CONDITIONS.

New York, Nov. 5.—Boxers participating in bouts under the provisions of the "Walker law" hereafter must conform strictly to the clause providing the stipulated weight eight hours before contests. It was announced today by the state boxing commission. Mutual agreements by principals to evade the law's weight requirements will not be tolerated, the commission announced. The decision was said to have resulted from the alleged agreement on weights between Jackson and Fitzsimmons in their bout in Madison Square Garden last week.

THISTLE CURLERS
ELECT PRESIDENT
TOMORROW NIGHT

Thomas Benson Is Mentioned For Office This Year — The Warren Thompson Trophy Up.

The Thistle Club will elect a president tomorrow night. This marks the departure from the usual procedure of electing three presidents each year. Thomas Benson's name is prominently mentioned in connection with the presidency, and it is altogether probable that the result of the ballot will find him filling that office for the next year.

QUANTITY OF GRAIN
IN STORAGE INCREASES

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—According to returns received at the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the week ending October 25, the quantity of grain in store at the different public elevators throughout Canada has increased by 23,199,639 bushels in all grains, as compared with the previous week. Increases are shown in wheat of 15,411,155 bushels; oats, 5,902,102 bushels; barley, 842,888 bushels; flax, 218,026 bushels, and rye, 25,525 bushels.

The movement of grain by water for the week ending October 31, is as follows: Wheat, 2,700,251 bushels; oats, 727,479 bushels; barley, 262,088 bushels; flax, 43,894 bushels, and rye, 78,282 bushels.

The lower lake ports received 2,913,574 bushels of wheat; 712,479 of oats; 193,065 of barley, and 28,235 bushel of flax.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Elmer Espaner of Pittsburgh, Pa., who for more than a quarter of a century was identified with the management of all the big trap-shooting contests held in the United States and Canada, today was elected president of the American Trap-Shooting Association.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Final details of the contract governing the proposed world heavyweight boxing championship bout between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier, will be signed late today. Dempsey and his manager, Jack Kearns, were expected to arrive from Montreal during the day. Carpentier and his manager, Francois Descamps, plan to sail for France tomorrow.
