THURSDAY MORNING

Death is Reported After Long IIIness and Several Premature Announcements of Demise.

ADDIS ABBEBA, Abyssinia, March 30.—Meneilk II., King of Abyssinia, is dead, at the age of 66 years, and in the 21st year of his reign. The king was stricken with apoplexy last fall and never recovered his health.

Prince Lidj Jeassu was proclaimed heir to the throne on May 18 last. He is 14 years old and little less than a year ago was married to the grand-daughter, aged 7 years, of the late Empire of Abyssinia, or Ethiopia, includes the kingdoms of Tigre, Ambara, Shoa, with other tertitories and dependencies.
