PETRO-CANADA

Question No. 1,491—**Mr. Malone:**

1. What was the total cost of operating Petro-Canada to November 30, 1976?
2. What is the projected total expenditure for the next 12 months?
3. How many exploratory wells for natural gas or crude oil had been drilled by Petro-Canada to November 30, 1976?
4. How many wells drilled have revealed a field with oil or natural gas development potential?

Hon. Alastair Gillespie (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): 1. Please refer to Petro-Canada's Annual Report tabled in the House of Commons on April 5, 1977 pursuant to Section 75(3) of the Financial Administration Act.

2. The Capital Budget for 1977 of Petro-Canada was approved on December 23, 1976 by P.C. 1976-3275. The total expenditures so indicated were \$271.6 million for capital items and \$20.5 million for operating costs including interest expense.

3 and 4. The figures available for wells drilled are based on year end December 31, 1976. The attached table includes only wells drilled by Petro-Canada and does not include wells drilled by Panarctic Oils Ltd. in which Canada has approximately 45% interest.

2. What is the estimated (a) direct (b) indirect cost in (i) employment (ii) income to the Cornwall area resulting from the loss of the Parks Canada Regional Office?

3. What is the latest figure for average family income in (a) Cornwall (b) Guelph?

Mr. Ralph E. Goodale (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): I am informed by the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development and Statistics Canada as follows: 1. Yes. (a) A meeting was held with DREE officials at their Toronto Regional Office to discuss the results of DREE's analysis of their programme involvement in the Cornwall area and to discuss the proposed Parks Canada relocation. (b) January 21, 1977.

2. (a) (i) Employment—139 jobs; (ii) \$2,150,000 annual payroll. (b) Approximate value of local goods and service purchase orders, \$8,500 per year—office rental costs—\$117,422.

3. With regard to Project No. 76-695 of the Pacific, Asia and Africa Division of the Office of Export Programs and Services (a) what were the names and addresses of the Canadian firms that participated (b) how many orders were placed (c) what type of goods were ordered (d) what was the total value of the orders?

4. Prior to Project No. 76-695 did any of these firms sell goods in Iran?

5. With regard to Project No. 76-694 of the Pacific, Asia and Africa Division of the Office of Export Programs and Services (a) what were the names and addresses of the Canadian firms that participated (b) how many orders were placed (c) what type of goods were ordered (d) what was the total value of the orders?

Mr. Hugh Poulin (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): 1. (a) Canadian firms did not participate directly in this in-store promotion. C & A Brenninkmeyer conducted the promotion as a commercial endeavour. According to this source, 122 Canadian companies were selected to supply merchandise. Identity of these companies is proprietary to C & A Brenninkmeyer. (b) Firm orders were placed with 93 of these companies. (c) Total value of these orders at this time is \$5,118,064.
