OUR KILTIES ARE ALLIED WITH THE FAMOUS GORDONS

Announcement Made at Last Night's Parade and Welcome Extended From Afar.

The 48th Highlanders paraded last night at the armory 388 strong, under command of Major Henderson, in the absence of Lieut.-Col. Macdonald, who is in Winnipeg. There was no march-out in the army list, under the name of that regiment there should appear "Aldie Regiment, 48th Highlanders." Letters were also printed from Col. Burney, commanding the Gordon Highlanders at the depot at Aberdeen, extending a sincere welcome to all ranks and expressing the hope that the alliance might long continue to the benefit of the British Empire.

Major Nersis received his letter by which he is to have the honor to be allied to our regiment a colonial battalion, and no doubt this fact will tend to increase and further promote these most desirable sentiments of unity between Canada and the mother country.

The Gordons are one of the famous regiments of the British army, and their headquarters of the regiment are in Aberdeen. The colonel in chief is H. R. Prince of Wales, P.M. and their colonel, Sir George Stewart White, V.C., is in India. The first battalion (75th Foot) is now in Egypt; the second battalion (92nd Foot) is in India; the third battalion, Aberdeenshire Militia, and there are six volunteer battalions in addition, being the 1st and 2nd Aberdeenshire regiments, the Buchanan, Donachie Highlanders, Deeside Highlanders and the 1st Banff Regiment.

The population of Rutnam is 31,000.

Report Still Incomplete.

While the main body of Inspector Howe's report for the underwriters is completed there are a few additions to it which are being made.

INCREASE IN INFLUENCE OF CONTINUATION CLASSES

Growing in Number and Efficiency and Blossoming Into New High Schools.

The reports received at the education department show the steady growth of continuation classes in numbers and in efficiency. There are four grades of these institutions, established only in municipalities having no high schools, with 66 classes in grade "A," 45 in "B," 116 in "C," 189 in "D." To be in grade "A" the principal must have at least a first-class certificate, and give regular instruction only in pupils who have passed the high school entrance examination; in grade "C" at least five, and in grade "D" at least three who have passed the high school entrance examination.

The government grants to the classes are, respectively, \$100, \$200, \$300, and \$400, and the county council must pay at least an equivalent. In many places to their credit they contribute more than the minimum required. Sixteen schools in grade "A" employ two teachers, giving their time exclusively to continuation class work. They are: Alliston, Beeton, Stayner, Tottenham, No. 5 Essex, Milton, Shelburne, Durham, Paisley, Wingham, Brantford, Wallaceburg, No. 4 Tilbury W., Amherstburg, Alvinston, Parry Sound, Two schools employ three teachers in each case, viz.: Chesley and Exeter. When two or more teachers are employed in a school, the government grants a correspondingly increased grant. The county council contributing the equivalent.

In the development of continuation classes several have already become high schools, shown by the recent establishment of high schools at Rat Portage, Port William, Sault Ste. Marie, North Bay, East Toronto, Chesley and Midland, and steps taken to open a high school at Plantagenet. Continuation classes are substantially doing high school work, and the revised regulations make those schools which are in grade "A" subject in some respects to the same examination provisions as the high schools and collegiate institutes.

MORGAN TO RETIRE.

New York, Sept. 23.—J. Pierpont Morgan, Jr., has leased a New York house furnished for four months and is going to spend the winter here. Mr. Morgan expects to take up the details of the management of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co. at the end of the year, when his father will retire from active business, the remaining nominalty at the head of the firm, 200 Broadway, Wall-street heard these facts yesterday, and was not surprised thereat, for Mr. Morgan's retirement had been expected for more than a year. J. Pierpont Morgan, Jr., is thirty-six years old, six feet tall and weighs 200 pounds. He has a chest measurement of 48 inches, is athletic and fond of outdoor exercise.


The Asie Broke.


