

SHRINER HEAD DELIGHTED WITH LOCAL VISIT

Imperial Potentate Says Scenery Here Cannot Be Excelled Anywhere

Luxor Temple of the Mystic Shrine of Saint John has been entertaining Imperial Potentate of North America, David W. Crockett of Montgomery, Ala., over the week-end and when he left here last night for Portland he stated that while it is not his practice to visit one place twice in the term of potentate he wished at a later date to come back to Saint John. As Luxor Temple intends holding a ceremonial towards the latter part of November there is little doubt that the Imperial Potentate will be in Saint John on that date.

He was accompanied on his present trip by Frederick Pierce of New York and D. R. Lyles of New York and arrived in the city on Saturday morning. The visitors were greeted by members of Luxor Temple and were shown points of interest about the city. On Saturday afternoon accompanied by 13 of the Nobles of the Shrine they moved to Wood Lake near St. Martins where they were entertained hospitably. The party returned to the city on Sunday evening. Yesterday morning other points of interest were shown to the visitors and at noon the Imperial Potentate held a reception at Masonic Temple when some 100 Nobles of Luxor Temple attended. The Imperial Potentate was heard in a very interesting talk which was appreciated and was cheered to the echo. Mr. Lyles and Mr. Pierce also spoke in the interests of the Shrine. An excellent buffet luncheon was served and afterwards the Imperial Potentate and his party were guests of Luxor Temple at the Saint John Exhibition. Supper was served at the Victoria hotel and the Imperial Potentate and his party left on the Boston train for Portland, Me., where they will visit Poland Springs today. Tomorrow the Potentate will be the guest of Kora Temple, Lewiston, Me. He will then tour through the North England States on his way back to Alabama, which he expects to reach about Sept. 30. He has been traveling for the last two months through different parts of the United States, and Canada. He could not speak too highly of the courtesies shown him while on his visit to Saint John and he vouched for it that for scenery Saint John county could not be surpassed. Nobles from many parts of the province were in the city for the visit of the Imperial Potentate. Some of these provincial Shriner's left for their homes last night. Others remained to pay another visit to the Saint John Exhibition.

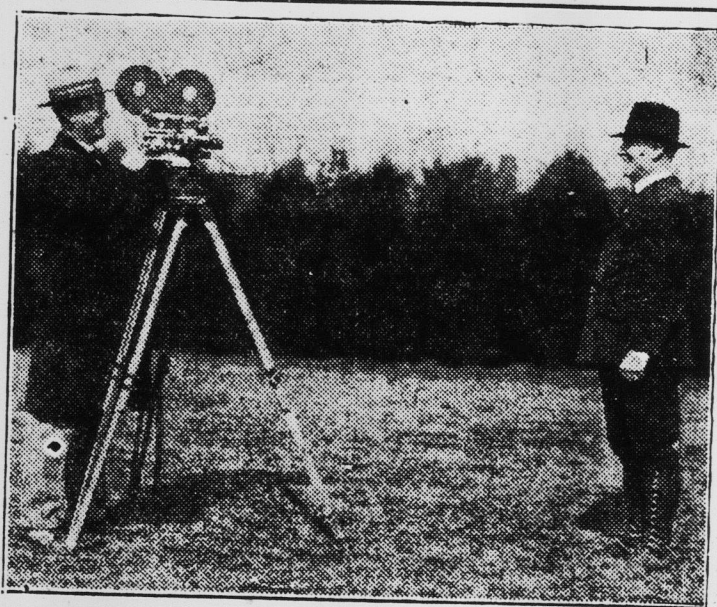

DISPLAY MADE BY C.N.R. VERY FINE SHOWING

Railway Booth at Saint John Exhibition Exceeds Previous Presentations

The exhibit of the Canadian National Railways at the Saint John Exhibition this year surpasses anything heretofore attempted by the Railway in Saint John, and is attracting a great deal of attention.

The main feature consists of a large panoramic view of Jasper Park Lodge, the famous mountain resort of the Canadian National at Jasper in the Canadian Rockies. The scene is an exact replica of the lodge and its surroundings. In the foreground is shown Lac Beauvert, and in the distance Mount Edith Cavell with its glacier of the Angel's Pyramid Mountain and Old Man Mountain. The latter mountain takes its name from the face outlined on the dome, which is as clear cut as though some master sculptor had carved its lines. The whole is lighted in such a way as to give some idea of Canada's greatest national playground. While one is standing taking in the various points, a train is seen to emerge from one side and pass to the other, giving a realistic effect to the whole scene. In front of the panorama at the bottom is a colored map of the lines of the Canadian National Railways, among which are several of the Maritime Provinces, and on the other an illuminated display featuring the various hotels owned and operated by the Canadian National Railways and the safety first, first aid and Radio activities of the railway. A rather historical note is the display of the first set of the European and North American Railway, which now forms part of the lines of the Canadian National Railways between Saint John and Shediac. The banner depicts a sailing ship with sails set, and the motto underneath "Success to Commerce". It is now the property of the Canadian National Railways, having been purchased from a resident of Saint John. The illustrated literature covering the country passed through by the Canadian National Railways in the Maritimes as well as the other provinces of Canada, which is being distributed by representative of the railway, and which is in great demand, is of great advertising value in the way of broadcasting the scenic attractions and the advantages Canada has to offer the tourist.

MASSEY DECLARES PROSPERITY HERE

Reviews Tariff Issue and Says at Pembroke Plants Are Busy

PEMBROKE, Ont., Sept. 6.—After having listened to Right Hon. Arthur Meighen advocate of a protective tariff at a meeting in the Armories, here Saturday afternoon, electors of North Renfrew, re-assembled in the same hall in the evening and heard Hon. Vincent Massey tell of an era of prosperity, which he claimed, had descended upon the farm implement and automobile manufacturing businesses.

Mr. Massey reviewed the tariff question and quoted figures showing that as a result of the reduction made in one farm implement duties in 1924 by Mr. King's government, 37 Canadian factories engaged in making these implements, who in April, 1924, employed 8,417 men, in June, 1926, were employed 12,226 men, and in 1926, 1,688. "Does that," he asked, "look like destruction of the business?"

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N. B. OPTOMETRICAL ASSOCIATION HAS ITS CONVENTION

Sixth Annual Gathering Held at Royal Hotel Here Yesterday

At its sixth annual convention held at the Royal Hotel yesterday the New Brunswick Optometrical Association agreed to follow the lead of the other Maritime Provinces in giving support to the Canadian College of Optometry, which has been established in connection with the University of Toronto. The Canadian College of Optometry will provide a two-year course and the first term of that course has just been completed.

It is hoped eventually to have the college controlled by a Dominion board of governors, but at the present time it is under the Ontario board of examiners. The New Brunswick Association at its annual meeting yesterday pledged financial assistance to the Canadian College.

Warren Maxwell, of Fredericton, president, was in the chair at the meeting and was re-elected to office. Other officers chosen were as follows: Vice-presidents, first, A. T. Crilley, Saint John; second, A. C. Rockwell, Saint John; secretary-treasurer, Eli Boyaner, Louis Boyaner.

It was agreed that the examinations this year for certificate of registration

in New Brunswick should be held in Saint John on Sept. 13 and 14.
