

N. B. SKATING ASSOCIATION PLANS TO DEVELOP YOUNGER TALENT

ANNUAL MEET
TO BE HELD HERE
ON FRIDAY NEXT

Representatives From Moncton and Sackville Expected—Plans for Season

THE annual meeting of the New Brunswick Amateur Skating Association, which has control of this sport in this province, has been called for Friday afternoon of this week in the office of Messrs. Nagle and Wigmore, when officers will be elected and plans for the season discussed. It is expected that representatives from Moncton and Sackville will be in attendance at the gathering, as much enthusiasm has been shown in these places over ice skating.

Speaking of the outlook for the present season, Frank White, president of the association, said this morning that the idea of the association this year would be to try and encourage the younger skaters and the intention was to hold a number of minor meets. Of course, the Maritime championships would be held as well, and it was made to give the younger element an opportunity to develop.

It is expected that all will be harmonious at the meeting as it was said that there would not be any contentious subjects coming up.

This association is affiliated with the Amateur Skating Association of Canada, which meets soon, and also the International Skating Union, but it was said that representatives from the local body would not be sent to these gatherings as it was not the intention this year to ask for a sanction for a Canadian International meet here.

The meeting of the International Skating Union will be held at Detroit on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of next week. D. J. Corr, of Saint John, is a vice-president of this organization, but said this morning that he did not expect to attend the meeting there.

While Charles I. Gorman, world amateur champion, is still undecided in his program for the coming season, it was said that there was plenty of less prominent talent here who would furnish plenty of opposition and excitement for the lover of the ice skating game who likes to hear the thud of the steel blade cutting the frosty surface of a perfect sheet of ice.

CLUBS DO NOT MAKE AS MUCH AS THOUGHT

Ruppert Says Baseball Profits Are Greatly Over-estimated

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Asserting that the club would have lost money had the last world's series been decided in five games, Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees, today said that the profits from baseball in general are greatly over-estimated.

A copyrighted article in the New York Evening Post quotes Ruppert as saying that "we do not make much from a six-game series" in the course of an interview, during which he said no basis for suspicion in the fact that the last three world's series have gone the seven-game limit.

"Nobody is quicker to investigate rumors of scandal than the owners themselves," continued Ruppert. "We realize we must keep the game clean in order to protect our own property."

Ruppert was quoted as asserting that he had never taken a cent out of baseball, but had invested his profits in developing the game. Pointing to an expenditure of \$200,000 for players last year, the owner of the Yankees held plans, says the Post, for increasing the seating capacity of his stadium from 65,000 to almost 90,000.

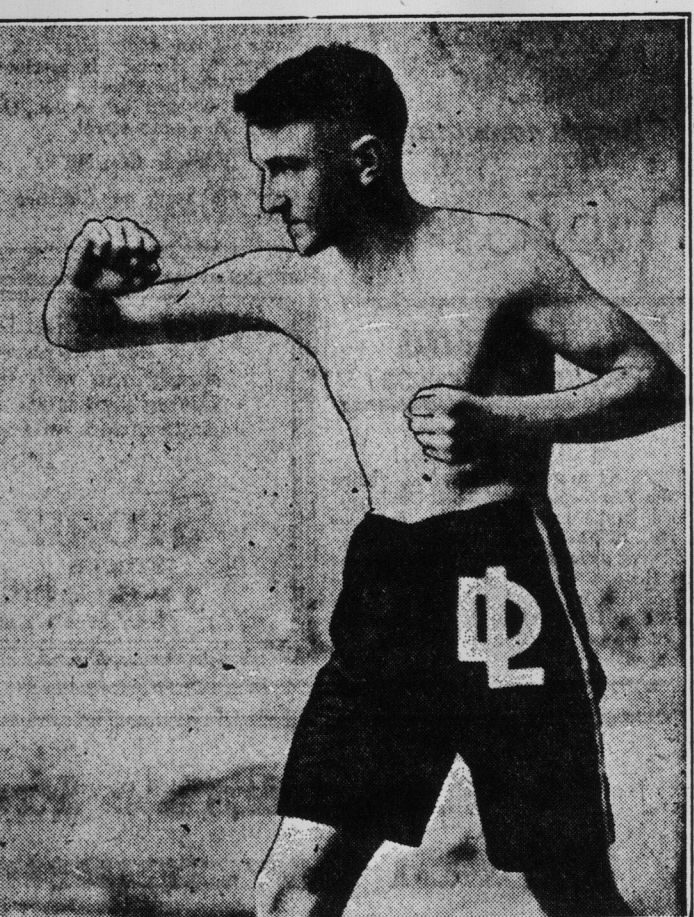

FINN WINS 10-MILE FOR FOURTH TIME

Ritola Captures A. A. U. Championship Race at Yonkers

YONKERS, N.Y., Nov. 2.—Willie Ritola, of the Finnish-American A. C., today won the national 10-mile A. A. U. championship for the fourth time, equalling the feat of his compatriot, Hannes Kolehmainen.

The fleet-footed Finn came from behind to save the race in the last mile and a half after a cramp had forced him to yield the pace-making position to Gonzales Moreno, an army runner, during the seventh mile. The latter finished second, 50 yards behind Ritola, while Ove Anderson, another Finnish star, was third. Ritola was clocked in 53 min. 30.5 sec.

He then pushed ahead to cover the seven miles in 52 min. 44.5 sec., leading Michael Pecora of Hazelton, Pa., by 20 yards. Max Meiss, of the Newark A. C., was third.

LEARNED A LOT

"I learned a lot in my fights with Greb," admitted the champion, "I learned, among other things, the value of sharp-shooting, for it was necessary to be a sharp-shooter to catch Greb. He was always on the go, side-stepping, retreating, advancing, always moving."

"Fighting Greb, I gained confidence in myself. I could see myself improve from fight to fight. The first time I met him he whipped me. The next time we fought I whipped him. When we matched again I whipped him. This time I whipped him."

"The last time we fought was at St. Paul. I could have knocked him out that night. When the fight ended Greb said to me, 'I've fought you for the last time, Gene. You are too tough. Go and beat Dempsey.' Greb was the first fighter of consequence who admitted I was ready for Dempsey."

WOULDN'T BACK UP

"I think everyone who saw the fight at Philadelphia will admit that I made Greb back up more than once. Well, I fought Greb five times and I never made him back up a single time. I knocked him back with punches frequently, but not once did he ever back away."

"Tunney thinks the quality that made Greb an extraordinary fighter was his native enthusiasm for the game."

"You don't find that in many fighters, but you find it in a marked degree. That's one reason why he preferred to fight himself into condition instead of training on the road with the gymnasium. It was more fun."

TUNNEY MADE CHAMP BY GREB, SO GENE SAYS

Heavyweight Title Holder Pays Remarkable Tribute to Dead Fighter

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Gene Tunney, heavyweight champion of the world, had just returned to his home from Pittsburgh, where he was a pall-bearer at the funeral of Harry Greb, a two-time champion.

Tunney was a great admirer of Greb, and the tragic result of the operation which ended the eccentric German's earthly career deeply touched Dempsey's conqueror.

"Everybody said Greb was a down fighter," commented Tunney. "They called him a windmill and a freak, a useless puncher who won his fights mainly because he had speed and could keep slapping and cuffing away. 'To me Greb was a great fighter. Indeed, I think he was the greatest fighter, in spots, I ever saw. He could box as well as anybody when he set out to hit. He had a fine defense, and there was nothing wrong with his footwork."

"Of course Greb had certain marked eccentricities in the ring. He was not what the game calls an orthodox fighter. But there was much more to him than clownish gestures and spectacular acrobatics. Behind all this was a real fighting background and a rare courage."

Tunney gave credit to Greb for his own gradual development into a heavyweight champion. Tunney fought Greb five times. Once Greb beat him. That was, incidentally, the only time in his life he was whipped. It was from Greb that Tunney won the light heavyweight championship.

OF THE OLD SCHOOL

In naming Bush as manager of the Pirates, Barney Dreyfuss, owner of the club, selected a leader of the old school.

Bush is of the aggressive type, a game little fighter who never quits. He holds that his players assume a similar attitude toward baseball.

He said he recalled the first game he played in the American League. It was back in 1908, early in September. He came to the Detroit club unheralded, but it took only one game for him to break into the headlines.

He arrived a few hours prior to game time and was rushed into the lineup.

I don't if Bush ever played a more remarkable game during his entire major league career than he did that day. He made four plays in which he handled balls hit directly over second base.

The veteran Herman Schaefer, playing second base for Detroit at the time, would walk over and shake hands with Bush after each play, while the crowd yelled its approval of the mighty shortstop. In those days Bush didn't weigh much more than 150.

During the remainder of the season he played 20 games for Detroit, felled sensationally and hit 60 points better than his minor league record with Indianapolis.

I think it is conservative to say that Bush made possible five victories by his sensational all-round work. His value to the club in the home stretch can't be so appreciated by the fact that the moment was not decided in Detroit's favor until the last day of the season by the margin of one-half game.

Bush is a miniature John McGraw in style and mannerisms. There are few of his kind still in the game.
