LOCAL NEWS

COMMISSIONER AWAY

SCOUT CHIEF NEXT WEEK.
 Dr. James W. Robinson, C. M. G., of Toronto, is expected to arrive in the city next Monday. While here he will address the scout masters and council. He is also going to Halifax and Prince Edward Island. In Charlottetown he will reorganize the Island Provincial Council of Boy Scouts.

TURN TO RIGHT
 Printed stickers, which are intended to be attached to the inside of automobile windshields, have been obtained by the public safety department and will be distributed to automobile and truck owners of the city as a reminder when the rule of the road has been changed from "Turn to the Left" to "Turn to the Right."

RODNEY WHARF TRESTLE
 Commissioner Bullock announced this morning that the New Brunswick Power Co. had agreed to retain the present fence which now stands along the face of the Rodney wharf trestle in West St. John, as well as to erect a fence between the roadway on the wharf and their tracks. He said that he had the matter up with the company yesterday and proposed to bring in the report on the matter at this afternoon's council meeting.

EMPIRE EXHIBITION
 Hon. W. E. Foster, Premier of New Brunswick, has written to the Canadian Prime Minister, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, expressing the sympathy of the New Brunswick Government with the action taken by the Dominion in connection with the reservation of space at the British Empire Exhibition in London next year. Asked what the province planned in connection with an exhibit, the Premier replied that nothing had been done in the matter so far, as the Provincial Government was awaiting the announcement of arrangements by the federal body.

BRIDGE AND DANCE
 A very enjoyable bridge and dance was held last evening in the Venetian Gardens by the staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia branches. The upper floor had been reserved for this occasion and about thirty-five couples enjoyed dancing until a late hour. During the evening dainty refreshments were served. The party was ably chaperoned by Mrs. J. H. Stevenson, Mrs. A. J. McQuarrie, Mrs. W. A. Clark and Mrs. G. E. Connolly, and the affair, as is usual with the dancing given by the members of the staff of this bank, was voted a huge success.

C. P. E. SESSION
 A meeting of the New Brunswick District Association of the C. P. E. R. was held this afternoon at St. Mark's Hall. D. W. Newcombe, the president, was in the chair and among those present were J. H. Boyle, superintendent from Brownville; J. R. Gilliland, superintendent at Woodstock; W. A. Walsh, agent at Greenville Junction; in addition to local officials and a number of employees from various parts of the district. Among the topics under discussion was the handling of passengers and freight in view of the opening of winter traffic here.

AT LILY LAKE.
 Joseph Tebo, proprietor of the pavilion at Lily Lake, is busy at present getting ready for the winter season. At present he is completing the installation of a new check room, and has also ready a room for local speed skaters to be used exclusively by them for training purposes. He reported today about three inches of ice on some parts of the lake, but in other places it was not so thick. While a few of the speed skaters have had a work out Mr. Tebo does not think that the ice is solid enough for a crowd and is not anxious to see many on the ice. He promises to notify the skaters when he considers the ice safe.

TRAFFIC CASE
 F. W. Nugent, today was charged with speeding at the intersection of Prince Edward and Hanover streets on Sunday afternoon and with failing to blow his auto horn. He pleaded not guilty and Policeman Young and McGrath gave evidence. Policeman Young said that the car, number 8-900, had passed the intersection of the streets at a speed of about twenty miles an hour and that the horn had not been sounded. Mr. Nugent said he might have been going twenty miles an hour but that he did not consider the point where the two streets met an intersection as they did not cross. Policeman McGrath corroborated the evidence of Policeman Young. Mr. Nugent was told that he was liable to a fine of \$20.

C. G. M. M. SEASON
 Preparations are well under way for the opening of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine winter port season here in readiness for the arrival of the first steamship here, the Canadian Spirit, which is due here about next Monday. Today H. E. Seeley, the assistant superintendent, arrived from Montreal to take up his duties and opened the dock office. His staff is due to arrive on Friday and everything will be ready for the efficient handling of the business. Mr. Seeley is well known in the city, having been in charge here since the C. G. M. M. first commenced the use of St. John as a winter port.

FINES IN THREE LIQUOR CASES

Taken Up in Police Court This Morning—Fines and Jail in Another Case.

John McCusland was before the police magistrate yesterday afternoon charged with having liquor in his beer shop in Mill street. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$200 or six months in jail. Inspectors Journey and Killen gave evidence.

This morning William Compton pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession other than in his private dwelling, on Saturday. Inspectors Killen and Caron were responsible for the case. A fine of \$200 or six months in jail was imposed.

Fred Heaton pleaded guilty to having liquor in his beer shop in Water street this morning and was fined \$200. The evidence was given by Inspectors Killen and Caron and W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution.

George B. Climpson pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession in Cribb street and to assaulting his wife. He was fined \$8 for being drunk, \$8 for being out after nine o'clock, \$8 for assault and was sentenced to jail without the option of a fine for assaulting his wife. One man charged with drunk driving was fined \$8 or two months in jail.
