

## LOCAL NEWS

### NAVY LEAGUE.

R. E. Armstrong, president of the New Brunswick division of the Navy League, will leave for Montreal on Monday evening to attend a meeting of the Dominion Council of the Navy League, which will be held in that city on Wednesday.

## HAVE A STRONG ORGANIZATION IN ROTHESAY PARISH

### Excellent Meeting in Interests of Government Candidate Last Evening—Premier Speaks in Support of J. D. McKenna and A. F. Bentley.

A very representative meeting of supporters of the Provincial Government party was held in the Consolidated Assembly Hall at Rothesay last evening and the work of organization was taken up and carried on very successfully. This large parish has a considerable number of centres, such as French Village and Upper Golden Grove, Quispamsis, Model Farm and Hammond River, Glendale Point, Fair Vale, Rensford, and Rothesay Village, and for each of these a vice-chairman was appointed, while Roy Carleton was chosen general chairman of the parish with Richard Gilbert and Harry MacMackin as secretary and assistant secretary.

After the work of organization Premier Foster, who, with his family, will be moving to Rothesay this week for the summer season, dropped into the committee room and addressed those present for a half hour upon the issues of the campaign, the record of his government and reasons why he thought they should send him another supporter from the County of Kings. He congratulated them upon the choice of their candidate, Mayor McKenna of Sussex, who had in so many ways shown his interest in the county affairs for a long time. He dwelt upon the fact that not only had Mr. McKenna been chosen by the people of Sussex Record and publisher of the recognized farm newspaper of the maritime provinces. He also spoke in eulogistic terms of A. F. Bentley, the government candidate for the County of St. John, and said that these were the right kind of men to send to the legislature.

Commenting briefly upon the candidature of Mr. Brooks in the County of Kings, he said that for a considerable number of years Mr. Brooks had been school inspector under the board of education. During that time if he had any fault to find with the administration of the schools and the condition of the schools in the poorer districts, he was devoted in his duty if he had not brought the attention of the board of education to these matters. On the contrary, he thought it would be found that Mr. Brooks was a very capable and efficient school inspector. He said that he was much pleased to see Mr. Brooks in the board of education did not find so much fault in his capacity as school inspector as he did as a candidate for the opposition.

## LOCAL NEWS

### IN SUMMER ATTIRE.

"All change" was the pass word at the police station today when the police force appeared in summer uniforms. A new badge of very attractive design decorated the caps. In the centre of the badge is the city coat-of-arms, surrounded by a laurel wreath just inside which is a narrow blue band with the words "Department of Public Safety, St. John, N. B." in gold letters. The new badge greatly enhances the appearance of the cap.

### POLICE COURT.

Two juveniles from Sydney, arrested here last evening on the arrival of the Halifax train by C. N. R. Police Inspector J. P. Ryan, in charge of stealing a ride on the train, appeared this morning in the police court before sitting Magistrate Henderson, and were remanded pending inquiries. Both said that their parents knew they were going to leave home, though they did not give their consent. The police have telegraphed to Sydney regarding the boys and will await a reply before taking further action.

### TRAFFIC MATTERS.

Aubrey Bradley, reported by Sgt. Spinney and Policeman McNeill for speeding on Sunday evening at the intersection of Charlotte and Union streets, disclaimed any knowledge of the charge. The report was against automobile number 9-345. This car, the accused said, belonged to his brother and was registered in his brother's name. He owned a car himself, but the number of it was 4-276. He was told that inquiries would be made. Policeman McNeill gave evidence.

### THE ADA A. MCINTYRE.

The examination of the schooner Ada A. McIntyre was completed this morning by Captain A. J. Mulcahy, Captain N. A. Wilkie and W. H. Knight. The result was given out as follows:—The whole shoe and keel are gone; nine feet of the sternpost is gone and the rudder stock is broken; four feet of the heel of the stem and the gripe is broken; the deadwood and garboard are chafed seventeen feet back from the stem; the rudder casing is broken; nineteen strips of the bottom banking on both sides will have to be replaced. Mr. McIntyre said this morning that no decision re the repairing of the vessel would be made until the cost had been arrived at by the board. In the meantime the vessel will be left in the slip.
