

LEGISLATURE PROROGUED

Shortest Session on Record
Ends at One O'clock This
Morning—98 Bills Passed
—No Increase in U. N. B.
Grant.

Fredericton, April 15.—The first session of the eighth legislative assembly of the province of New Brunswick came to a close at 12:30 o'clock this morning when Hon. William Pugsley, lieutenant-governor of the province, declared the assembly prorogued. As usual the interval immediately preceding the visit of his honor to the legislative chamber was marked by certain informal activities on the part of the members who took that means of expressing their pleasure at being relieved of legislative duties which had occupied four weeks and a half.

The chief item of the last business transacted by the house was the passing of the supplementary estimates, which included only minor items. In this connection Hon. W. E. Foster, the leader of the government, referred to the fact that application had been made on behalf of the University of New Brunswick for a considerable increase in the amount of the annual grant from the province. He said that the application had received careful consideration from the government but the latter had not been able to see its way clear to grant so large an amount. The university would continue along the lines of the last two or three years until a policy with regard to its future could be worked out. The estimates of this institution for the year had exceeded those of the year before by \$5,000 or \$6,000, and the government considered that it was its duty to make up the deficit. Premier Foster stated that this university was a state institution and must be recognized as such.

Mr. Richards, one of the representatives of York county and himself a U. N. B. graduate, expressed regret that the government could not see its way clear to give the additional grant this year. He trusted that on another occasion, possibly next year, something could be done. Mr. Burdock, of Carleton, a member of the Farmer group, spoke along similar lines, strongly supporting the claim of the University of New Brunswick to increased provincial aid. Both of these members expressed pleasure at the definite statement of the premier of the recognition of U. N. B. as a state institution and the closing hours of the session were marked by the adoption of a unanimous vote of the house of two very important resolutions bearing upon the relation of this province to the Canadian confederation.

ation. On motion of Premier Foster, seconded by Mr. Baxter, the house adopted a resolution to the effect that the dominion government should take over the St. John & Quebec Railway. With the same mover and seconder and with a speech in support by Mr. Fawcett, leader of the Farmer group, the house adopted a resolution against the increase in railway freight rates.

Much energy was displayed by members of the legislature in the afternoon. Many bills were put through the committee stage and approved by the house. The bill by which it was proposed to arrange for superannuation for the civil servants of the province caused a spirited debate and definite opposition from the members on the left of the speaker. The bill was finally left over for later consideration. The opposition suggested that on account of the financial conditions this was not an opportune time for such action. Members of the opposition were divided in their attitude toward increasing the salaries of the members of the legislature. The leader of the opposition and Mr. Richards favored the object of the legislation, but suggested that the province could get along with fewer ministers. Finally it was decided to allow the government to take the responsibility for the bill, and it passed. The new schedule increases the salaries for 10 ministers from \$2,100 to the following: Attorney general, minister of lands and mines and the minister of public works, \$3,500 each; minister of health, minister of agriculture and provincial secretary-treasurer, \$3,000 each. The salary of the premier remains at the old figure of \$2,400.

The amendments to the health act by which a method of collecting of the amounts levied on the municipalities is fixed also passed. The chief criticism was directed chiefly toward the administration of the act rather than at its objects. Members from different parts of the province told of the act had operated in their districts. J. L. Peck suggested that the estimates for the carrying out of the regulations should be fixed in each county by a committee made up of members of the board of health and the municipal council.

Mr. Burdock said that he was opposed to the bill when he came to the legislature, but since he had heard the explanation given by the minister of health he thought the act was worthy of consideration.

The session just closed has been the shortest on record. A considerable number of very important bills have been passed. The total number of bills presented to the legislature was 102, rather fewer than the average number. Of these four were killed, leaving a total of ninety-eight bills passed by this house.

Public Health Act.
The committee took up consideration of a bill to amend the public health act.

Hon. Mr. Roberts explained the purpose of the bill which was to compel payment on the part of municipalities, which had failed to vote appropriation for public health. He said that in the event of a municipality refusing to vote an appropriation the lieutenant-governor-in-council might advance the money necessary to carry on the service. He read an amendment to sub-section 1. Mr. Baxter said that it would be a mistake to pass a bill to compel municipalities to pay money, when a law was already in existence under which that could be done. The law commanded respect and it was unthinkable that some counties were paying and others were not. The expression of that opinion did not prevent him from sympathizing with the counties which had refused to pay money which they thought would be largely wasted. They must pay and have regard for the law. The minister of public health was attempting to perpetuate something which had appeared often in the pages of the public accounts. He (Baxter) had belonged to an administration which had been confronted with a case of non-payment similar to this. The solution adopted by the government of the day had been to place power in the hands of the lieutenant-governor to take any money in sight to meet the appropriation, the municipality making up what was taken in some other manner. It had never been found necessary to resort to the measure. Instead of such a method the minister proposed to take legal action, thus making it necessary to maintain lawyers and produce heavy bills of cost. That was absolutely unnecessary. There was enough waste and enough burden without adding gentlemen of his own profession. There was not a member of the opposition who was against the health act, but they were against sham and against waste.

The Benefits of the Act.
After some further discussion in which Messrs. Smith, Peck, Veniot and Hunter took part, Dr. Curran said that the reason so many die before they reach the age of one year was due largely to improper feeding and lack of knowledge. His honorable friend from Charlotte (Taylor) would agree. The Red Cross was acting in this connection in an attempt to reduce the rate. How could that be done except under an organized department and a health act? There was

one district where the rate of infant mortality was thirty. It would be a good district into which to send nurses. So far as tuberculosis is concerned there were approximately 4,000 cases in the province; institutional treatment could be given to 180, three per cent. This disease must be combated by prevention of its spread, and to that end the instruction of both physicians and patients is necessary. The health department could furnish it.

It was estimated that annually the people of the province pay \$1,000,000 for medical treatment. Five per cent of disability through sickness was due to preventable diseases. That meant within the province 3,500 working people were continually disabled by preventable diseases. At a wage rate of three dollars per day that would mean an annual loss of \$3,000,000. From these two sources alone the annual loss to the province was \$4,000,000. Medical inspection in rural districts would improve at the time went on, and within a year or two would justify itself. The same would be true of sanitary inspection. It had been suggested by an honorable member of the opposition (Peck) that the municipal councils should be permitted to assist in the preparation of estimates. He understood that the department was prepared to go farther than that and give the municipal councils a majority on the sub-committee board. It must be disastrous if health administration were not kept out of politics.

Of Importance.
Mr. Burdock said he was beginning to think that the health act was of some importance, and that opposition to it had a close connection with party politics. He hoped that the minister of health in conjunction with the farmers' party would be able to discover serum that would eliminate parasitism.

Mr. Smith, (Carleton), said the trouble with the act in his county was that the health officers were not distributed properly along the railways. It was all right, but in the back districts it was a failure. The debate was continued by Mr. Taylor and Hon. Mr. Roberts and the bill agreed to.

Prorogation.
Premier announced his honor the lieutenant-governor would prorogue the house at 1 o'clock. The house then took recess.

At the appointed hour his honor entered the chamber and prorogued the session with the following speech:

"Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the legislative assembly:
"In bringing the present session to a close and relieving you from further attendance I desire to express my appreciation of the diligent attention which you have given to the discharge of your legislative duties. In addition to the many acts of private and local character which have been passed, you have been asked by my government to consider much important legislation and measures for the prosperity and improvement of the province, included in these are an

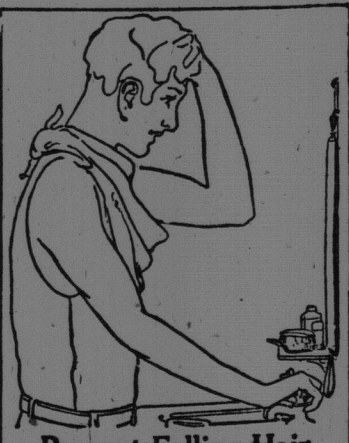

act for the prevention and suppression of fires, an act which will provide assistance in the way of loans to normal school students to assist them to enter the teaching profession, acts to further protect highway legislation, and to amend the motor vehicle act so as to insure greater safety of traffic upon the public roads, an act relating to partnership, and also an act to consolidate and amend the law relating to county courts; also a new game act, intended to give greater protection to the game and fur-bearing animals of the province.

"I thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the several important services of the province. The passage of important resolutions, one of which will authorize the dominion government to take a referendum on the question of the importation of liquor from other provinces, another looking toward the acquisition by the dominion government of the St. John and Quebec Railway, and another with reference to railway freight rates on the dominion government railways in the maritime provinces, will, I hope, have very beneficial results. I now relieve you from your legislative duties and in bringing the session of the legislature to a close permit me to extend to all of you my earnest wish for your individual prosperity and happiness."

DEFENDS HIGH HEEL FOR WOMEN'S SHOES

British Doctor Says Skirts Hammer Hips
When They Are Walking.

Women need high heels because they are not able to move their hips as freely as men, according to Dr. W. H. Trethowan, speaking before the Institute of Hygiene in London, England. "Women," he said, "being hampered by skirts, cannot get such freedom of movement at the hips as men are able to do, and for this reason women need the most efficient support afforded by heels. The action of the foot in men is not nearly as marked as in women, as men propel themselves with the hip movement and long strides, while women walk more with their feet."

"It is impossible to find a civilized adult with a perfect foot, one of the ideal shape which will do the work properly and gracefully. The war showed us that we are a nation with misshapen feet. The ideal foot heel in general is the Cuban. The Louis heel is based on account of its curved mechanical shape and the insufficient support it gives.

"Children with normal feet do not require much of a heel. Women, however, favor high heels and, while no doubt some wear them purely for reasons of hygiene in London, England, the majority adopt them in response to the belief afforded to the ligaments of the foot. Most ready-made shoes fall miserably in the support and the border of the feet, and this, together with waists that are thin and unyielding and bulge downward after two or three weeks' use, affords insufficient support and is largely responsible for the breaking down of the foot."

Dr. Trethowan said that in selecting shoes the important points to be borne in mind are the length and breadth of the soles, the roominess of the toe portion and the pointing inward of the toe or the selection of a straight liner border.

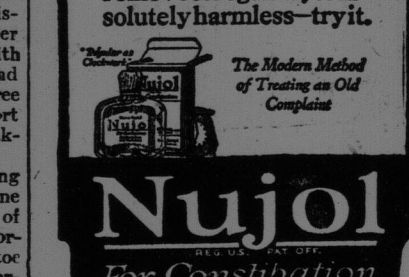

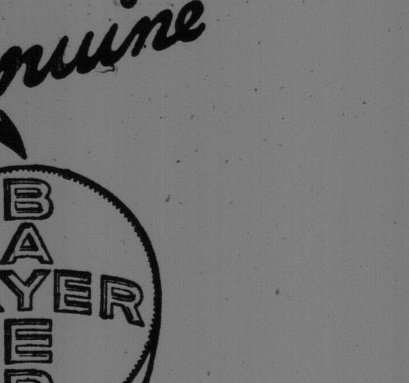

TORONTO HELPED 7,115 FAMILIES

No Less Than \$420,000 Spent
in Relief Work During
Winter

(Toronto Telegram)

Giving of civil relief to unemployed ceased today, except for exceptional cases, and these will be cared for by the Salvation Army and House of Industry, the city having appropriated \$25,000 for the purpose.

Amount expended by Toronto during the past winter as a result of unemployment totals \$420,000. The city's proportion of the combined provincial and Dominion Government and civic contributions was \$200,000. There was also the \$25,000 for carrying on the work. Approximately \$100,000 was spent in giving relief work in the parks and \$25,000 by the Property Department for painting and repairs to buildings. There was also a grant of \$70,000 to the House of Industry for distribution of food.

System of Relief.

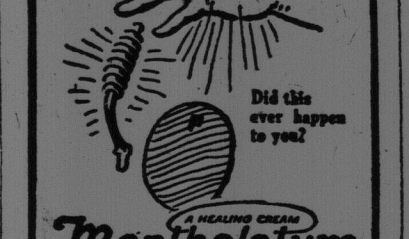
The system of relief in a large scale was commenced in December. Since December 14 last, when the bureau was established, said Rev. J. A. Miller, who was superintendent, "we registered 23,400 out-of-workers, and before that there were 2,000 on the list. There were about 10,000 who did not come to us. I would judge there were about 35,000 out of work this last winter. I don't believe any better system of handling things could have been established."

As Bad Next Winter.
Up to April 5, 7,115 families got city relief, and it appears that many of them will not be in any better position next winter. "If they do get work during the summer at reduced wages their clothing supplies will have to be added to," said Mr. Miller.

Relief work was supplied to about 700 men by the city, each man getting \$4.80 a day for three days' work in the week and on this the city got about 75 to 80 per cent. return on money spent. As next winter may be as bad, if not worse, than last winter, it is advocated

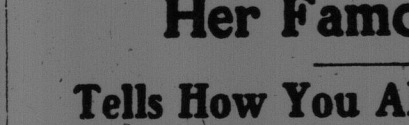
