## ACCEPTING INVITABLE

(Toronto Globe)

It would seem that the Canadian banks have made good headway in educating the business interests of the country to the necessity of accepting restricted credit under present conditions. At least, that claim was made yesterday by rep- resentatives of two large banks with headquarters in Toronto. At first, the announcement to the business community that there would not be enough money to go around on the basis formerly pre- vailed was greeted as a measure of harsh- ness, but gradually business men have been educated to realize the necessity of the situation, the bankers said, and now things are running smoothly.

"It did seem hard," said one banker, "that reputable firms and manufacturers with expanding businesses should be un- able to finance on a generous scale, par- ticularly when they had large orders coming in, and it was not pleasant to say, 'You must curtail your operations simply because we have not enough money to go around.' However, it looks as if we are over the credit difficulty, and the situation is being accepted with a good grace. The banks are now in a good position to handle the crop which we all hope and expect will be heavy. Of course, if the crop is heavy and we need extended credit for moving it, the note circulation will have to be increased temporarily, and while you may call that inflation, it is a step that would be abundantly justified on economic grounds for the wheat would really be better than gold, for it is something the world badly needs."
