THREE COURSES OPEN TO WILSON

In Any Case Long Delay in States Over the Peace Treaty Is Likely.

Washington, March 22.—Although active steps to declare a state of peace by congressional resolution are not expected until late this week, Republican leaders of the Senate and House are to begin conferences today on the form such a declaration should take.

Some senators and representatives want to phrase the peace measure in the simplest affirmative terms, others prefer to repeat the declaration of war and go on record as withdrawing concessions from Germany, while others are for inclusion of some sort of a declaration of international policy.

For the present the Knox peace resolution has the right of way so far as the Senate programme is concerned. In the House the situation is less definite, the Republican leaders there having formulated no policy.

With the treaty back at the White House and plans for a peace declaration still in their formative stage, a respite of several days generally is expected before another congressional debate on the issue is raised.

Three courses are open to Mr. Wilson. He can return the treaty to the Senate, in which case the Republican leaders declare it will be pigeon-holed indefinitely; he can do nothing, while he waits for the verdict of the people in the political campaign, or he can treat the treaty as a dead letter, so far as international diplomacy is concerned, and proceed to negotiate a separate peace with Germany, a step which he alone, under the constitution, could initiate.

Whichever of these he chooses a long delay seems inevitable before he can bring the country to a full peace status and the state department holds that until such a state is attained, the present diplomatic and trade relations with Germany must be continued.

THE MISSION FOR MEN COMMENCED

An impressive ceremony marked the closing of the mission for women in the Cathedral yesterday afternoon and last evening the mission for the men of the parish was opened by Rev. Fathers Pannagun and Lynch, of the Congregation of St. Vincent de Paul, Philadelphia.

His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc was present at last evening's service and every available seat in the church was occupied. After vespers, at which Rev. Wm. Duke officiated, Father Lynch announced that the masses in connection with the mission would be at 8:30 and 9:30 o'clock and the evening devotions at 7:30. He was followed by Father Pannagun, who delivered an eloquent sermon on the greatest business of man, that of saving his soul. The service closed with the Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Both masses this morning were attended by large congregations of men and the instruction on the sacrament of penance was given.

LABOR FIGURES IN BYE-ELECTION

London, March 22.—Discussing the recent by-elections, the Herald, labor publishes the following figures:

The turn-over of votes in the constituencies contested since the general election is as follows:—
Coalition—General election, 177,984; by-elections, 158,878; decrease in coalition vote, 19,106.
The total labor vote for the constituencies contested since the general election has increased as follows:—General election, 561,126; by-elections, 148,872; increase in labor vote, 87,756.

BANK EMPLOYEES SEEK INCREASE

Twenty-Five Per Cent. Up to \$2,000 and New Rules Regarding Night Work.

Toronto, March 22.—The Royal Bank Employees' Association has written to the head office of all the chartered banks in Canada asking for a twenty-five per cent increase in salaries up to \$2,000, dating from January 1, 1920, "without prejudice to any annual increase and allowance at present in force (with a minimum of \$200)."

Other improvements in the conditions and work of the bank employees asked for include:—
No night work, except on Saturdays and Mondays and special occasions, such as pay nights, with alternate staffs for night work, and the head offices of the banks to "treat through its officers with duly accredited representatives of the employees association on all matters of grievance which may arise between employers and employees."
