ST. JOHN SOLDIER WOUNDED IN FIGHTING IN FRANCE; LETTER COMES TO WIFE, MRS. WHITWORTH

Struck in Chest at Bethune and Sent to Hospital in Torquay-Other Letters Come From St. John Men

A mixed feeling of joy and doubt pervades the modest little home of Mrs. A. E. Whitwork in Brussels street this morning. This morning's mail brought word from her husband, Albert E. Whitwork, a private in the Worcestershire Regiment, who, for more than a month, has been on the fighting line in France. But the letter comes from the Red Cross Hospital at Torquay, England, and says that, although the gallant soldier lies with a wound in his chest, he is resting comfortably and getting on as well as might be expected.

The letter was written by the president of the Torquay branch of the British Red Cross Society, but gives very little details of the extent of the wound or how it was received. He fell while fighting near Bethune, in the north of France.

The following is the text of the letter:






