On motion of Commissioner Russell the grant was fixed at \$2,500, the same as last year. The Home of the Good Shepherd again asked for \$600.

Commissioner Fisher was informed that they had not submitted a statement. Commissioner McLellan said that the work was carried on in conjunction with other work, and a statement would include the work of the whole institution. He did not think there were any grounds for regarding the labor of prisoners as of any value. He moved that \$300 be granted.

Commissioner Fisher objected to the principle of giving grants without a statement of the work done. The mayor said he had opposed the grant last year, as he regarded it, and the Salvation Army had not submitted a statement. He asked if the county was not contributing?

Commissioner McLellan said he had made a claim, but it had not been adjusted. Commissioner Wigmore explained that the persons sent there had not been sent to the institution, and the county secretary had refused to pay for them.

The motion was put and lost. A motion for a grant of \$300 to the Salvation Army was not seconded.
