Abusing Privileges

THERE is a certain class of people in this world who are regularly given to abusing their privileges. Some of these people are in the position of being given privileges by the law, and some are given privileges by the custom of society. In the case of the law, the privileges are given to the rich and the powerful, and in the case of the custom of society, the privileges are given to the well-to-do and the influential. In both cases, the privileges are given to the few and not to the many. The result is that the few are able to abuse their privileges, and the many are left to suffer the consequences. This is a state of affairs which is not only unjust, but it is also a state of affairs which is a threat to the stability of the society. It is time that we took steps to prevent the abuse of privileges, and to ensure that the privileges are given to the many and not to the few.

Again, many stores are very liberal in their delivery privileges. At some shops in even the largest cities, even the least expensive purchase may be sent free of charge. But there is such a thing as using this privilege reasonably and stopping there. To be sure, you have a RIGHT to have even the little parcel which you could easily slip into your hand bag, but the idea of the system is merely to relieve the customer of cumbersome packages, and when you oblige the expressman to make a special trip to your house to bring a toothbrush or three pairs of stockings, you are grossly abusing your privilege.

There is reason in all things. Just because the shop grants you these privileges as a matter of business, does not justify you in abusing them. Decent people have a sense of honor and decency in business dealings as well as personal relations. Besides, there is a human element in everything. You have an idea that it is only the firm which suffers when you abuse one of its privileges. Nine times out of ten some individual is also affected. Witness the incident of the white gloves.

INSURANCE CASE.

In the non-jury case of the Pacific Coast Fire Insurance Company vs. John L. Hicks, of Seckville, before Judge White yesterday, in which the plaintiffs seek to recover \$20,000 insurance paid to the defendant, the operations of a couple of insurance companies in this province were brought to light. Mr. Hicks, in addition to his other insurance had taken policies amounting to \$5,000 in a Pennsylvania company which it was said, and afterwards proved fraudulent. He had not given notice of this to the local companies and they contended that this violated their contracts. The defence is that, as the companies were fraudulent, the additional insurance was not actually effected. The hearing was adjourned until September, when the argument of counsel will take place.
