WILLIAM G. FELLOW PASSED AWAY THIS MORNING.

For the past few days his condition had been critical and no hope was entertained for his recovery.

The deceased was decidedly popular with his fellow employees, in fact all who knew him, and the announcement of his death will be received with sincere regret by a wide circle of friends. He was in his 32nd year and is survived by a widow and one child. He was a member of the S.O.E. and the A.O.U.W.

The funeral will take place from his late residence, King street west, on Friday afternoon to the Ingersoll Rural cemetery. Service at the house at 2 o'clock.

TOWN LEAGUE HOCKEY

ENTHUSIASTICALLY DISCUSSED AT LAST NIGHT'S MEETING.

Town league hockey was enthusiastically discussed at a largely attended meeting held in the council chamber last evening at which Mr. S. A. Gibson presided. Representatives were in attendance from the various factories and from all parts of the town, and all came out in no uncertain manner in favor of the organization of a league. There was some discussion as to the classification of the players and eventually the suggestion that there be three leagues—junior, intermediate and senior, seemed to meet with the approval of all in attendance. The junior players must not be over 15 years of age. There will be no age limit for the intermediates and seniors, but the classification of the players will be in the hands of a committee composed of Messrs Jas. Grieve, R. Lomney and H. T. Cole. This plan it is felt will obviate the difficulty that has been experienced in the past of players being selected indiscriminately. The names of prospective players must be in the hands of the committee by Monday evening as it is the intention to hold another public meeting about the middle of the week at which it is expected organization will be completed. Much enthusiasm has been created and a successful season is anticipated.

GOOD NEWS FOR THE SHAREHOLDERS

Practically all of the York County Loan Property Sold—
Another Dividend

Toronto, Jan. 6.—It was announced yesterday that practically all of the York County Loan property has been sold and the dividend in connection with the payment of another dividend of 25 cents is under way.

In order to get the highest price on the sales, the liquidator, Mr. R. Home Smith of the National Trust Company, has disposed of the property on terms ranging from twelve to eighteen months. Before the end of this year, probably next autumn, the dividend will be distributed amongst the 114,000 interested shareholders. The dividend work connected with the declaration of this dividend is extensive and it will take many months to complete the task.

The last dividend was for 25 cents and was passed last spring.

There will be a recount of the ballots cast in the local option vote at Barrie, on Jan. 16.

CLOSE SCORE IN LONDON GAME

Ingersoll Juniors Made a Fine Showing—Were Defeated 5 to 3.

Rallying in the second half when the score was 5 to 0 against them, Ingersoll juniors made a whirlwind finish in London last night. They were defeated by a score of 5 to 3 in what every spectator had no hesitation in stating was one of the best junior games ever witnessed in the Forest City. It was the Ingersollites' first game away from home and conditions were vastly different to what they were accustomed to. The rink is much larger than Ingersoll's and the crowd was noisy, but despite these facts which sometimes have a serious effect on young players the Ingersoll puck chasers made their presence felt every second of the playing period. They did exceedingly well. Here's congratulations to the team.

LONDON'S VIEW.

Of the game the Free Press says: In one of the scrappiest games of hockey witnessed in the city in a long time, the London junior O.H.A. team last night defeated Ingersoll by a score of 5 to 3.

There was nothing to the game but play, play, play. The puck was on the go all the time. The pace set by the teams was terrific and abated but little. Ingersoll has the bigger team, but London, though short, have the weight and both teams took advantage of every asset they had to win.

The score at half time was 3 to 0 in favor of London, and in ten minutes play in the second half the Londoners succeeded in piling up two more. It looked like a shut-out at this stage, for London's babes were maintaining a fast pace. At three-quarter time, however, Ingersoll poked one in, and a few minutes later, with a little combination, scored their second, and a minute later their third and the last tally of the game.

LONDON CHECKED WELL.

London's checking saved them the game. There is a possibility that even the intermediates could take a few lessons from the juniors along this line. Back checking was their only suit, and it wasn't their only one, but every member of the team checked well. Their isn't a doubt but what Ingersoll would have won out had it not been for the wonderful checking of the local babes. Walden and Dinsmore particularly shone when it came down to the checking. Dinsmore was up against Kelly of the Ingersoll team and the man that the St. Thomas boys claim pounded them to pieces. Well, he didn't pound Dinsmore or Walden although it times he tried it.

INGERSOLL PLAYED WELL.

The Ingersoll team put up a good game. Their little combination saved them from a shut-out. They are some fast skaters and fairly good stick handlers for a bunch of juniors. Houghton, is without doubt the best player on their team. Their wing line is fairly good.

From a spectator's standpoint there was certainly lots of fun. Every trick or move over tried in a hockey game to get the puck into their opponent's goal was employed by the players of the different teams. London played an individual game as usual. Hardly once did they try combination at all.

Ingersoll tried lifting the puck. Kelly seems to be an adept at this, and he had many tries, but that is as far as they went. They never scored on one, although they tried many times to dribble one in.

ALL MANNERS OF PLAY.

Kicking the puck, shiny, piggy-in-the-hole and every other kind of a game in which hockey sticks or Irish shilleahs are used, was tried by the players, but, despite this fact, the game was a good one. Penalties there were many but the referees had a hard game to handle, and a hard bunch of players. Half the penalties were inflicted by the referee just because he thought there was some dirty work, and on several occasions penalties were inflicted where they should not have been, and in other cases were passed up when the player should have decorated the boards.

Still, as has been said, Referee Gunn had a hard job, and he hasn't eyes in the back of his head. The puck was on the go all the time and he did his best, which is all that was asked of him. On the off sides he did fairly well considering the play.

SECOND HALF.

After five minutes' play in the second half, Walden slipped a nice one from right over to Gillies, who poked it in for their fourth tally. Gillies and Morrison repeated after five minutes' more play, which ended London's scoring for the game although on divers occasions London shot some heady ones at their opponents' goal.

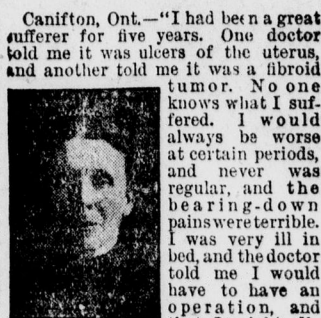
After 15 minutes' play Ingersoll slipped one in on a shot of Wilson's from the back of his head. The puck was in and he was off for five minutes. Houghton and Beers slipped in their second on a combination play and their third followed a minute later on a shot of Henderson's from right wing. This ended the tallying of the battle. The balance of the game was fast and furious. Near the latter half London tried to rush matters and the game got hotter, slashing and waving of sticks being much in evidence, but no harm was done.

Efficiency of technical education. Germany has been far in advance along that line and her aggressive competition is forcing other countries to adopt more modern methods of manufacturing and developing ideas, trade, industry and citizenship ought to be developed concurrently in this country. It is a notable fact that fifteen out of twenty leaders of thought in scientific research are Germans.

BETTER DAYS DAWNING.

It is a deplorable condition that the military spirit prevails yet to the extent it does in maintaining and training immense standing armies at enormous cost, but better days are dawning. A policy of peace is being promulgated, and Germany leads in that line. There are twelve peace associations in Great Britain and forty-three in Germany. Railroads, telegraphs, steamship lines, monetary institutions and various other factors are strengthening the bonds of humanity and diminishing the possibilities of war in future. It will be a grand thing if zones of human activity could be established and each nation assigned to the development of a common bond of humanity, when the "sword shall be beaten into a plowshare and the spear into a pruning hook."

THE "GERMAN WAR SCARE."

Notwithstanding the alleged "German War Scare" there cannot be war between Britain and Germany. The commercial, industrial and humane forces are too powerful to be overcome by a few avicious agitators. There is little hope from the "Upper Ten" but the great mass of people will control the situation.

Today temperance societies are flourishing in Germany and the Kaiser has taken an advanced position in advocating sobriety. The leaders of scientific research and economic thought realize the importance of sobriety.

We cannot attain our highest standard of efficiency if we indulge in liquor and tobacco. Drinkers and smokers depreciate their value to the State.

Who could carry on war if the already powerful trades unions would declare a general strike as soon as any nation declared war? The co-operation of the Federation of Labor and the laboring classes would make war impossible in any civilized country. The speaker paid a high tribute to the greatest of English kings, the late King Edward, and his powerful influence for peace all over the world.

A VOTE OF THANKS.

A motion by Postmaster Gibson, seconded by Rev. H. B. Christie was heartily approved by the audience, expressive of their high appreciation of the noble sentiments and interesting information they had listened to.

Prof. Horning in accepting the vote of thanks supplemented his lecture by still further emphasizing the need of paying more attention to practical education and he exhorted young people to keep their eyes front, heads up, be pure and to live clean, useful lives, striving to attain the highest ideals of citizenship.

The National Anthem was sung as a fitting close to the lecture and a number of citizens went forward and were introduced to the distinguished lecturer.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Col. Higginbotham, ex-M.P. for North Wellington, died at Guelph.

A battle royal is in progress at Washington over the Long Sault Rapids project.

The storm of yesterday and the day before in the west is said to have been the most severe in years.

In fine fourteen gamblers yesterday, Magistrate Duly of Winnipeg, said that the next offenders would be given jail terms without the option of a fine.

An increase of 9,875,407 tons in traffic through the Canadian canals up to Dec. 1, when nearly all of them closed, is shown by returns to the Department.

A fox terrier was burned to death in a house in Toronto Sunday night, and three persons were forced to jump from windows to escape, while thirteen were driven to the street by the flames.

Col. W. C. Moserip, clerk of the County Court of Perth, and deputy registrar of the High Court, died on Saturday afternoon after a short illness of pneumonia. He was formerly commander of the 24th Perth Regiment.

Robert Leach, who proposes to go over Niagara Falls in the Mitchell lifeboat next June, said last night that he had a letter from the inventor of the boat, in which he says he believes the Government will adopt the invention for ocean steamships.

Express Car on Fire.

Winnipeg, Jan. 9.—The express car on C.P.R. train, 97, which left the city for the west, took fire a short distance west of Poplar Point, about 40 miles west of Winnipeg, Saturday night. The car was run back to Poplar Point, but the fire gained such headway that it was impossible to subdue the flames. It is stated that the contents of the cars were completely destroyed.

Threaten Federenko's Family.

Winnipeg, Jan. 9.—M. J. Finkelstein, who conducted the defence of Savio Federenko, has received a letter from a friend of the latter in Russia, who says that the police have raided Federenko's home, seized all his papers and personal belongings and threatened his family that every member will be thrown into jail unless the Federenko agitation is immediately stopped.

A Long Season.

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—F. T. Congdon, M.P., says a record was made last season in dredging in the Yukon. It extended over 233 days. It is remarkable that a gold dredge can work to great advantage up to two weeks of Christmas, there are difficulties in the Yukon not experienced in other countries, but it is being proved that they can be overcome.

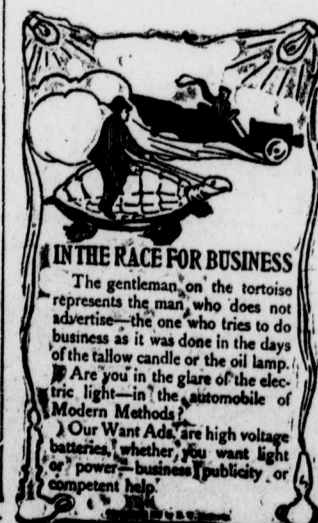
