THE HONEY MAKERS.

Queenless bees nearly always lay drone

It stimulates a colony to build some drone comb.

If swarming be permitted, neither the swarm nor the parent hive will regain its normal strength during the season.

All colonies are not ready for the surplus boxes at the beginning of the honey flow, and additional space is a detriment. Surplus boxes should not be added to any colony at any time unless the bees can be induced to occupy the boxes immediately after puting them on.

When the brood chamber is full of bees, brood and honey, it is time to give additional space at any time prior to the honey season.

Conditions for swarming are a honey flow, a hiveful of combs and the circumstrated with bees. If there is no room given, the hive will swarm.

To take comb honey to the best advantage we must have good, populous colonies of bees, and when they are in this condition swarming is quite likely to occur any time.—St. Louis Republic.
