

The undergraduates recently celebrated their success in the Summer Eighties. Fifty-eight years have passed since this college last won the championship of the river.

It was decided to celebrate the victory by holding a huge bonfire in Christ Church Meadow. Rumor had it that the fire was to be the flaming of the grand stand which has been erected in a field close by for the forthcoming pageant.

Between eight and nine o'clock, while the undergraduates were lighting the bonfire, the college grogram and the first hose, with engine and hose, moved unmobbed into the pageant field and quietly took up a position from which they were to observe the pageant stand. Then a posse of twenty-five policemen crept noisily over the turf and secreted themselves in the structure.

It was a cold business waiting in the New Wind, and at 10.30 the watchers began to shiver. They had been hoaxed by the trees in the distance, and when the flames they could see up the riverous trowd gathered in a great throng of dancing, and piping and playing of instruments. There were nearly 300 of them.

Suddenly, from the deep blackness of the night, a short sharp whistle came that a war-whoo, was emitted. It was

a signal from scouts to the undergraduates which had been eagerly awaited. Swiftly they sped over the meadow.

The police advanced to meet them with drawn truncheons, and then an amazing thing happened. The college boys drew back and arranged themselves like soldiers preparing for battle. Sky-rockets were stuck in the ground with their tips directed on the police. The lights were applied and the missiles exploded in a sudden flight of stars. The police turned and fled.

By this time the collegians had reached the fire, and stood there ready to vanquish by the hose those advancing body. With a swish like the sound of escaping steam, they drenched the riotous undergraduates. It looked as if the police were to have a speedy retreat, but reinforcements were a hand.

Round a bend in the river swept a long crowd of fit, brown and puny fellows with shrieking young men coming to the bridge, now guarded by police, they set it afire, and passed on to where concern was standing armed with burning poles. They were so busy, they veered over the water to the scene of uproar, and with a yell they dashed in to the meles. First they cut the hose aloft, and then they cut the poles aloft, they rushed among the police.

The grand stand was completely wrecked. Plank after plank and pile after pile were wrenched from the structure and conveyed to the bonfire. The damage is estimated at just over £800.
