ARTLETT MINES WILL WORK NIGHT AND DAY

Gov Ganda's First Electric Light Plant
Will be Installed in a Few Days—
Work Begins in Another Vein.

TORONTO, Aug. 28.—The first electric light plant at Gov Ganda will be ready in a few days on the Bartlett Mines, Gov Ganda, thus enabling it to operate its start of seventy men in two shifts, night and day.

The work of a large gang of men on surface stripping has borne good results, and two other good veins carrying silver values have been uncovered within 100 feet of No. 1 shaft, and will probably be taken in at the 100-foot level during the cross-cutting operations which will have just commenced.

An interesting feature of the Bartlett development is the starting of work on the big Calotte vein on the north group of properties. This vein is said to be from 6 to 24 inches in width, and carries the strongest silver-bearing indications. If silver values should be found in this vein, even in low grade assays, the body of ore would be so extensive as to make it a great concentrating possibility. This big vein has always been only secondary interest to the silver veins which are now being worked.

The company state frankly that, while their policy has been to concentrate their work on the silver veins, they have been impelled to do sufficient work on the big Calotte vein to ascertain its possibilities.

ESTIMATES WHEAT CROP 115,000,000

Quality is the Best Canada Has Had in Many Years, Says F. W. Thompson.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.—"The greater part of the crop in Manitoba is already out, and harvesting well advanced in the other provinces. Threshing is under way at many points, and it will be possible in a few days to make a very fairly accurate average yield."

This statement was made in an interview by Mr. F. W. Thompson, vice president and managing director of the Ogilvie Flour Mills Co., Ltd.

"While our official estimates of the crop have not yet been completed, we believe from the reports so far received that the total yield will approximate 115,000,000 bushels."

The Young One Does Not Understand Her Alleged Mother's Language—Puzzle for the Paris Police.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—A strange lost child perplexing the Paris police—An Armenian mother is claiming the girl as her daughter, but the latter disclaims her mother. The girl is only five years old, but talks with astonishing volubility. She happened of her own accord to call upon a policeman one day, but as she could not speak any apparently known language, he took her to the police station, where all the experts and interpreters at first failed to understand what she said.

Finally it turned out that she spoke some kind of Armenian dialect and an interpreter was found.

She then said that she had been taken away from her grandfather's home in Syria, by a strange woman, who wanted to take her to America, and who had, in fact, brought her as far as Paris. The little girl said that she had taken the first opportunity to run away from the woman. The police were astonished at the fluency with which the girl talked, and were about to send her temporarily to a home when the strange woman of whom she had spoken turned up, and said that the child was her daughter.

"I am not your daughter," reported the little one. "I know my mother. She is very different from this person." The police were seriously embarrassed. They put off the inquiry for the day to obtain a second interpreter, for the mother, or alleged mother, herself speaks a mixture of English and French.

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ICELANDERS WAR ON TUBERCULOSIS

New Sanatorium for Patients Now Being Constructed on the Island.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Tourists in Iceland during the present season might pay a profitable visit to the new sanatorium for consumptive patients which is now in course of construction and is to be opened next year.

As medical statistics showed that this dread disease was on the increase in the island, the Icelandic Old Fellows took the initiative in the matter by forming a Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis in the autumn of 1906, and met with immediate success. By a general contribution all over the country a sum of 20,000 or 40,000 kroner (about 18 kroner equal an English pound) has been raised.

The total initial cost of the institution, including furnishing, for fifty or sixty patients, is estimated at not more than 100,000 to 200,000 kroner. Thus the inauguration and maintenance of this beneficent scheme may be considered assured.
