Everilda, lumber laden, Liverpool. Two cargoes of lumber, one by the S. S. War Country, which sailed Saturday, and the other by the S. S. War Ottawa, which was expected to get away last night, will amount to over four million feet, at a value of well over one hundred thousand dollars.
