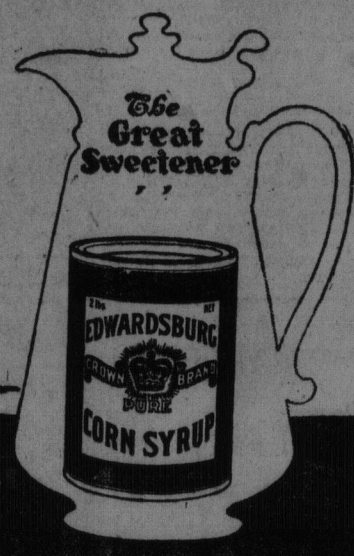

The institution ceremonies will take place in the Oddfellows' Hall, Market Place, which the new lodge has been fortunate enough to obtain as their Castle Hall. The instituting officers will call the meeting of petitioners to order at 7 o'clock.

Mrs. E. A. Young and her committee of ladies are making themselves responsible for the catering, so that all visitors are assured that West St. John's reputation for hospitality will not only be sustained but probably enhanced.

Big Storms Affect Telephone Service

Hundreds of Telephones Out of Commission, and Pending Repairs, New Installations in City Will be Suspended.

The New Brunswick Telephone Company is just beginning to realize the seriousness of the storm which hit their lines in Westmorland and Albert Counties on Saturday last. In the section of the toll line between Moncton and Memramook one hundred and one poles went down in a distance of fifteen miles. This same pole line at Fairfield, near Sackville, was also destroyed. At Sussex, near Roachville Bridge, fifteen poles also went down. In the Shediac Exchange, every farmer line is out of commission, and in Hillsboro and Albert Exchanges the details have been very scarce, owing to the interruption of the toll lines, and it is impossible to tell just what has happened. In the city of Moncton more than four hundred telephones are out of commission from the storm.

Resulting from the five storms which have hit the company's plant since the 6th day of February, the officials have found it necessary to entirely suspend the installation of new telephones in this city. The repairs from the previous storms being only of a temporary nature, naturally have been subjected to greater damage than ordinary from the last storms, and it is taking every man of the company's mechanical staff to keep up the toll service in the section damaged.

THE SALAD SUPPER.

A novelty in the way of suppers was given by the Ladies' Sewing Circle of the Tabernacle church, Haymarket Square. The affair was called a "Salad Supper," and several varieties of delicious salads were served to the guests as well as other articles to round out a fine bill of fare. CROSSING THE RIVER.

Many farmers crossed the Kennebec river on Tuesday from Whitehead and vicinity, and it is evident from this that the ice is not so thin as to be absolutely unsafe for pedestrians to travel. Although in some places along the river reports are in circulation to the effect that the ice is very unsafe for travelling and that in a short time hence it will be breaking up.

Some person under the influence of liquor last evening went to the trouble of smashing a window in the door of Henry Dolan's beer shop on Union street. The crashing of the glass drew a considerable crowd to the scene. It was rumored that the cause of the excitement was due to a fight.
