## Power Company And Douglas Ave. Rails

Company Sharply Criticized at Common Council Session—Other Business Transacted.

The stand of the New Brunswick Power Co., in the matter of rails on Douglas Avenue was sharply criticized at the council meeting yesterday morning by Commissioner Thornton, who stated that he would take up the rails and go ahead with the paving if the company would not put down the rails they had promised to. It was decided to pay W. C. Goodwin half pay for a part of the time he was overseas, according to resolution of council passed in November, 1914. Tenders for Winter street and for piling were opened and referred to the commissioners of the various departments and Commissioner Bullock was given authority to go ahead with the repairs to North Ward.

Mayor Schofield brought up the matter of a claim by W. C. Goodwin for half pay while overseas, under a resolution of the council empowering the commissioner of public works to pay this bonus to members of his staff enlisting. He reported having made an investigation and recommended that Mr. Goodwin be paid for 26 1/2 months, a total of \$461.25. Carried.

Commissioner Thornton reported having attended the meeting of the Millers Association in Montreal and seeing the machinery for handling flour, which he did not think would be suitable for this port.

Commissioner Bullock was given authority to make the usual arrangements for holidays in his department.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock it was decided to call for tenders for the coal supply for the coming year.

Commissioner Bullock presented the plans for the repairs to North Ward and on motion it was decided to pave that portion between the Market Square and Nelson street and replank the harbor line at an estimated cost of \$15,000 of which \$7,000 for the paving would be a bond issue.

**Harbor Commission.**

Commissioner Bullock brought up the matter of a petition on harbor commissioner and moved the matter be reconsidered, suggesting August 1 as the date on which the vote be taken. Commissioner Thornton wanted more time for consideration before a vote was taken by the council. The motion to reconsider carried.

On motion of Commissioner Thornton the contract for making 25 great coats for the city police was let to Oak Hall at \$23 per coat.

On motion of Commissioner Frink, Walter Cook was appointed a pound keeper.

**Douglas Avenue.**

Commissioner Thornton brought up the matter of Douglas Avenue paving. He said he understood the city had been held up by the Power Co., and wanted to know why. The hydro matter had nothing at all to do with the promise of the company to lay the rails on Douglas Avenue and if the company refused to carry out their

promise he would take up the rails altogether.

The Mayor pointed out that this was a serious question and must be considered from all sides. The taking up of the rails would only discommodate the residents of Douglas Avenue and Carleton and Fairville. No action was taken.
