

FROM ALL OVER THE MARITIME PROVINCES

That the citizens of St. John enjoyed the concert given by the Artillery Band in King square last Sunday afternoon was evidenced by the large numbers of people of all ranks who thronged the streets surrounding this beauty spot in the heart of the city. Educators have learned that moral qualities come through intelligently directed amusement and who among those who stood last Sunday amidst the trees and flowers, under the blue canopy of heaven, and noted the rapid and reverent expression on the uplifted faces, the impressive notes of Handel's Largo burst forth on the summer air, could doubt the wisdom of their learning. And what a pretty sight it was. The feminine portions of the assemblage like tropical birds were gaily costumed in all their summer finery and as this is particularly a season of color in the fashionable world, the dress was charming. The children were there, too, numbers of them. Band music in the squares being about the only amusement to be had without money, families were present to enjoy the music and the sunshine and the company of their friends.

From now until their arrival in the city on August 17 the members of the society will be the visit of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Her Royal Highness the Princess Patricia. The program of the visit which has been submitted by his worship the mayor and approved, provides for a guard of honor from the 3rd Regiment and the 1st Battalion of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to meet the royal party from their landing place at Reeds Point to Trinity church on Sunday morning. On Monday there will be a citizens' evening of welcome presented by Mayor Frank at the court house at 11 o'clock in the morning. The governor, general and staff will have luncheon at 1 o'clock at the Union Club, as guests of the mayor and commissioners, and while this is taking place the Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia will be guests of the Misses Hazen at luncheon at Hazen's castle. At 3 o'clock the governor and general will be at the opening of the new playgrounds at Rockwood Park. They will be driven to Courtenay Bay and in the evening of Monday at 8 o'clock a public reception will be held in St. Andrew's rink. The Duchess of Connaught, much to the citizens' regret, will on account of her recent illness be unable to take part in any of the public honors, but her place will be taken by the Princess Patricia.

Monday will be observed as a public holiday and there will be bands playing in different parts of the city and altogether there will be much general festivity. On Tuesday morning the royal party will enjoy a trip up river as guests of the lieutenant-governor. They will leave for other maritime cities on the steamer Earl Grey, which for the royal tour has been fitted with luxurious accommodations.

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
