Notice Will Be Served On Delegates From Berlin Government That Allies Are Determined To Enforce Payment of the Reparations Amount Decided Upon at Paris Conference -Germany Will At Same Time Be Reminded of Her Various Breaches of Versailles Treaty — Proposals of Germans Advanced With Evident Bad Faith.

London, March 2.-Notice to Germany that her reparation oposals submitted Tuesday would not be discussed with her, and that the Allies were ready to enforce the payment of the German obligations was in preparation today by the committee of the supreme council appointed to frame a reply to the German proposals.

The instructions given by the heads of the Allied delegations this committee were in substance:

First, the Allied governments decline to discuss proposals dvanced with evident bad faith. Second, Germany shall be reminded of her various violations

the peace treaty. Third, the German Government shall be informed of immediate teps the Allies are determined to take in beginning to enforce he collection of Germany's obligations.

The Allied representatives met at St. James' Palace at noon receive the report of the military and juridical experts, who ad spent the morning drawing up plans for action against Germany in case she did not comply with the Allied terms. Andrew Bonar Law, Government leader in the British House of Commons, and one of the Government's foremost financial experts, attended conference for the first time.

The Germans today were merely marking time, awaiting the mmons of the Allies to hear the decision on the German proposals. The results of vesterday's conference had been communicated to Berlin by the German delegates, but up to this afternoon they had received no new instructions from their government.

WOULD SEIZE GERMAN CUSTOMS.

No indication that the Allies intend to occupy additional German territory at present appears in the instructions given by the Allied leaders to this committee which is framing a reply to the German reparations proposals made Tuesday.
