

Chief Engineer of the Department of Public Works.—HENRY FULLERTON PERLEY, C.E. B. in St. John, N.B., 1831. Entered the public service of N.B. 1848, continuing until the summer of 1852 on exploratory surveys for proposed system of railways. In 1852 was engaged by Messrs. Peto, Betts and Brassey on surveys in N.B., and N.S.; and employed by them during 1854-55-56 on the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway between Montreal and Brockville. In Aug. 1856 again entered the service of N.B. as Resident Engineer on the construction of the E. & N. A. Railway, between St. John and Shediac, remaining until the completion of the line in Dec. 1860. Between 1861 and 1863 was engaged in private practice. In May 1863, entered the service of the Govt. of N.S., continuing as Provincial Engineer until Aug. 1865, then resigning to fill the position of agent for Messrs. Kelk, Waring Bros. & Lucas, contractors for the construction of the Metropolitan Extension (underground) Railway, London, Eng. At the completion of this engagement in 1870, returned to N.B. and took charge of the works in connection with the improvement of the freighting facilities of the Govt. Railways in that Province, and the construction of the deep water terminus and extension line thereto, at St. John. In May 1872, was appointed Engineer in Charge of Harbours, etc., in the Maritime Provinces for the Dept. Pub. Works, holding that position until the close of 1879, when apptd Chief Engineer. (Salary, \$3,200.)—*Western Departmental Building.*

Chief Architect of Department of Public Works.—THOMAS FULLER. B. in Bath, Eng., in 1823. Studied there and in studios in London. Came to Can. in 1857 and settled in Toronto. In 1859, in the competition for the Parliament and Departmental Buildings at Ottawa, his design for the former was adopted and he was awarded the second premium for the latter, including a design for a residence for the Gov. Gen. He was a successful competitor in his design for the new Capitol for New York State at Albany. Resided in Albany from 1867 until 1881, when he returned to Can. and was apptd. to present position. (Salary \$3,200.)—84 Nepean St., Ottawa.

Secretary, Department of Public Works.—ANTOINE GOREIL. B. at St. Jean, Ile d'Orleans, P.Q. 1853. Ed. at Quebec Seminary and Laval Univ. where he graduated in Law. M. 1877, Miss B. Gingras. Entered Department
