IRELAND FOR THE IRISH, Forcible Lecture in Favor of Home Rule

by a Methodist Preacher.

He had an audience of about 400. He dealt with the different phases of the Irish question in a forcible manner, and kindled the Irish blood to a high pitch of kindled the Irish blood to a nigh picel of enthusiasm. He has a poor voice and his arguments and illustrations are not very original, but coming from a Methodist and a minister, his utterances were received with a surprised sort of delight. He denied with vehemence the statement that Home Rule meant Rome Rule, and that the Protestant majority would be tyrannized over. He had traveled in different parts of Europe where Catholics were in greatmajority and no one had ever attempted to cut his throat. For W. E. Gladstone he professed the deepest veneration and the profoundest respect, and hoped that the vote which defeated him would soon be reversed. He touched on many other points such as landlordism and immigration, and was vigorously applauded every time.
