

to renew his solicitations for that purpose, with the king of Great Britain ; his majesty insists on this affair, with the more eagerness, as the end of their meeting is to keep up the good understanding, so happily re-established between the two crowns, and their subjects : and, that the king has nothing more at heart, than the maintaining, and settling it on a firm basis.

MEMORIAL delivered on the king's part, to my lord Albemarle, the 5th of January, 1751, and sent the same day to the duke de Mirepoix in England ; containing complaints made by France, against the hostilities committed, and avowed by the English.

FOR several months past, the public papers have proclaimed several acts of violence committed by the English on the French vessels ; both in the gulph of St. Laurence, and on the coasts of New France. But, these accounts appeared to be so contrary to the law of nations, and the amicable dispositions, of which the British court has given so many instances since the peace ; that they met
