Forecast of the First Whitney Speech From the Throne.

The Abolition of the Numbered Ballot, the Creation of a Department of Mines, the Extension of the Temiskaming Railway to Form Junction With G. T. P., Among the Principal Items of Legislation Promised.

Toronto, March 22.-At 3 o'clock this afternoon the eleventh Parliament of Ontario will be opened by Lieutenant-Governor Clark. A mounted escort from the Royal Canadian Dragoons will mpany His Honor from Government House to the Parliament Buildings, where a guard of honor of 100 men from the Royal Grenadiers will receive him and a salute will boom forth from field guns, manned by a detall of 35 men from the Fourth Field Battery of Hamilton, which is the corps commanded by Hon. J. S. Hendrie.

As soon as the Lieutenant-Governor

As soon as the Lieutenant-Governor ascends the Throne, the Assembly will be called upon to elect a speaker, and Mis Honor will withdraw to permit of this proceeding.

The nomination of Mr. St. John will be made by Premier Whitney and will be seconded by Mr. Harcourt, acting leader of the Opposition. The speeches will not be lengthy.

It is understand that the Lieutenant-Governor, after welcoming the members to their duties and expressing thanks to the Almighty for the abundant harvest of the past year, will note the increasing activity and enterprise of the people in all sections of the prevince, Reference will be made to the departure of the Earl of Minto as Gevernor-Genesal of Canada, since the last session of the Legislature. The severance of the official connection of the Governor-Genesal of Canada, since the people of Canada was greatly regretted by the people of Ontario. During his term he strengthened the attachment of the Canadian people to the Empire and to the principles of constitutional Government, by his interest in the progress and development of the Dominion. Reference will also be made to the active part of Lady Minto in philanthropic movements, and her departure, the speech will say, has been sincerely restreted. In this connection the Lieutenant-Governor will refer to the appointment of the Earl of Grey and express the hope that his tenure of office may be attended by the increasing prosperity of the people.
