CHINA HAS WHIPHAND.

See How Soon It Has Brought Yankee Business Men to Time.

Washington, June 25.—That the threats of the Commercial Guild of China to boycott American-made goods has raised a serious question in the minds of the United States business men and manufacturers is indicated by a telegram received Saturday by President Roosevelt from the Portland, Ore., Chamber of Commerce, urging "immediate action on your part with respect to this country's relations with China, the first consideration being a regard for the nation's honor, which demands faithful and fair performance of its treaty obligations. Secondly, our commercial interests are seriously threatened by the severe manner in which our present laws regulating the admission of Chinese into this country are executed, which seem to their practical working to contravene treaty obligations."

By direction of President Roosevelt, action has been taken by the administration which not only will facilitate the landing in the United States of Chinese of the exempt classes, but also will eliminate from the immigration bureau such administrative features as have been the subject of criticism by Chinese.

TWO SMALL BOYS DROWNED.

Had Been Playing on Log Booms at Victoria Harbor.

Victoria Harbor, June 25.—A double drowning accident occurred here Friday. Early Brown, aged 16, only son of Byron Brown, and Willie Brown, aged 15, only son of Robert Brown, were drowned while playing on the booms. The two children were missed after school, and search was instituted, but no trace of them could be found. Saturday at noon the hats of the unfortunate boys were found floating on the bay. The searchers started to grapple, and at 4 o'clock both bodies were found about 20 feet apart, one at each end of the boom.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Simmons and Miss Lynn were out driving in Victoria Park, when two of Miss Lynn's friends appeared and Mr. Simmons, with characteristic gallantry, resigned his seat in the rubber-tired buggy, and the three girls got in and started around the track alone, with Miss Lynn driving.
