CHINA HAS WHIPHAND.

Washington, June 28.—That the threats of the Commercial Guilds of China to boycott American made goods has raised a serious question in the minds of the United States business, mer and manufacturers is indicated by a telegram received Saturday by President Roosevelt from the Portland, Ore., Chamber of Commerce, urging "immediate action on your part with Ore. Secondly, our commercial interests are seriously threatened by the severe manner in which our present laws regulating the admission of Chinese into this country are executed, which seem in their practical working to contravens treaty obligations."

By direction of President Roosyeli, action has been taken by the agninistration which not only will racilitate the landing in the United States of Chinese of the exempt classes, but also will sliminate from the immigration bureau such administrative features as have been the subject of crisicism by Chinese.
