THURSDAY, MAY 7 A DELIBERATE UNTRUTH.

The Globe of yesterday makes the following announcement :-

The Attorney-General yesterday handed the following statement to the press:—"We are authorized to say that the statement made as to the release of A. L. Shambleau at Chatham being made on an order from the Attorney-General's Department is not correct. The fact is that no evidence was produced. There is nothing to prevent a fresh charge being laid and and the case prosecuted if proper evi-dence for that purpose is forthcom-

If the announcement of the Liberal organ is correct, then the Attorney-General deliberately handed out a statement that he knew-or should have known-to be absolutely false.

The fact that the prosecution of the late treasurer was stayed on definite instructions from the Attorney-General's Department is well known here in the County of Kent, and the storm of indignation which this action by the Government precipitated has doubtless caused the issue of the Attorney-General's untruthful statement.

To excuse its course the Government has energetically sought during the past two months to attach all blame and responsibility to the members of the County Council. It was said that, in addition to the big political pull exercised, representations were made to the Attorney-General's Department, to the effect that the Council wished it to be inferred that they were willing the prosecution should be dropped. The County Council has rightly refused to allow the Government to shift the blame upon them, and, at their special meeting last week, repudiated the attempt and passed a strong resolution asking the Crown to proceed with the prosecution and placing the responsibility of the staying of it definitely upon the Attorney-General's Department, which not only issued peremptory directions in the matter, but despatcha special messenger from Toronto to see that these directions were carried

So far as the Crown Attorney is concerned, it does not seem fair or right to blame him. While Mr. Smith, as a public official, declined to be interviewed, it is well known that, at the outset, he publicly took the proper ground that he could see no reason for treating this case differently from any other, and, if the matter were left to him, the prosecution would go on.

The fact that when the case came to trial, no evidence was offered was the result of definite instructions from the Attorney-General's Department at Toronto, and the statement published by the Globe, and said to have been handed out by Hon. Mr. Gibson himself, is deliberately and definitely untrue

It is a very small act on the part of the Government to attempt to shoulder off the blame of their apparent compounding of a felony upon the members of the County Council of Kent.

In view of the Council's strong action, it remains to be seen whether a political pull can again interfere with the administration of justice in this county.

The largest pies ever made were at Denby Dale, Yorkshire. The first pie was baked in 1788 in commemoration of King George III.'s recovery. The second pie was made in 1815 in honor of the great peace, which was ratified after the battle of Waterloo. ratified after the battle of Waterloo. Its contents were: \$\frac{1}{2}\$ sheep, 20 lowls, 150 lbs. flour. The third pie was to commemorate the repeal of the corn laws, 1846. It contained 44\frac{1}{2}\$ stones flour, 91\frac{1}{2}\$ lbs. suet, 19 lbs, lard, 16 lbs. butter, 7 hares, 14 rabbits, 2 brace pheasawis, 2 brace partridges, 2 brace gouse, 2 ducks, 2 geese, 2 turkeys, pair guives fowls, 2 pairs fowls, 6 pigeons, 63 small birds, 5 sheep, 1 calf, 160 lbs. beef. It was successful, and, put on a platform, was served to 15,000 a platform, was served to 15,000 people. The fourth pie was to honor the first jubilee of Queen Victoria, and should have been on August 27, 1887, which contained 64 stones 1887, which contained 64 stones flour, 1,850 its beef, 180 lbs. mutton, 160 lbs. veal, 180 lbs. lamb, 250 lbs. pork, 64 rabbits, 3 hares, 42 fowls, 40 pigeons, 12 grouse, 21 turkey, 5 geese, 100 small birds, 40 stone potatoes, 40 lbs. suet, 40 lbs stone potatoes, 40 lbs. suet, 40 lbs. and 30 eyrs.
