CONTRACTS OPEN.

ARTHUR, ONT.—David Brocklebank is about to build a large store.

RAYMOND, N.W.T.—The Corporation will place debentures on the market.

CAMPBELLTON, N.B.—A movement is on foot to erect a public hospital here.

CARBERRY, MAN.—The School Trustees have decided to build a High school.

MOOSE JAW, N.W.T.—The Council will take tenders on new boiler, engine and dynamo.

LACOMBE, N.W.T.—Frank Danner, of Skidmore, Missouri, has decided to build a flour mill here.

BURFORD, ONT.—Plans have been completed for a new building for the Crown Bank here.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—Mr. Weston, contractor, is about to build a residence on Jean street.

ELMIRA, ONT.—The Elmira Upholstering Co. will erect a three-storey building 60 feet square.

GLEN MORRIS, ONT.—The Grand Valley Electric Co. have decided to erect a new station at this place.

ESSEX, ONT.—Plans are being prepared by the Public School Board for two-room addition to school.

POINT EDWARD, ONT.—The Council are considering the question of securing a waterworks system.

COLLINGWOOD, ONT.—The Council have given notice of their intention to construct a sewerage system.

REGINA, N.W.T.—G. K. Hunter, Secretary-Treasurer, desires tenders by July 20th for constructing a septic tank.

PETERBORO, ONT.—The Fire, Water and Light Committee are taking figures on the survey of new fire engine.

CALGARY, N.W.T.—The Council have rejected the offer of Mr. Grant, of Macleod, to furnish electric power for street lighting.

EDMUNDSTON, N.B.—After taking tenders for construction of a waterworks system, the Council have voted down the proposition.

AMHERST, N.S.—A vote was taken by the ratepayers authorizing the Town Council to build new fire station and water extension.

ST. THOMAS, ONT.—A resolution was passed by the Town Council to ask Andrew Carnegie for an additional \$2,000 for the furnishing of the library.

PERTH, ONT.—The Board of Education have decided to construct a new closet system in the public school, the same to be connected with the sewers.

FERNIE, B.C.—A site for the Government post office building has been selected at the corner lot on Cox street, consisting of 120 square feet; price \$5,000.

NEWCASTLE, N. B.—It is proposed to expend the sum of \$25,000 in placing the line from Indiantown to Blackville in running order. Work will be commenced shortly.

QUEBEC, QUE.—Mr. Robitaille, acting for the Nuns of the Bon Pasteur, have purchased the Hazelhurst property on St. Foye road and intends enlarging the building.

SARNIA, ONT.—Plans are being prepared by the Imperial Oil Co. for a coal handling plant to cost about \$40,000 and to include two locomotive trains of six cars each.

NEW HAMBURG, ONT.—A by-law to raise the sum of \$6,000, by 20-year debentures for granolithic sidewalks and public school purposes was carried by the ratepayers.

ST. MARY'S, ONT.—The Town Council propose to submit a by-law to the ratepayers to grant \$35,000 to the C. P. R. to run a line into St. Mary's by way of Embro and Lakeside.

PORT HOPE, ONT.—The Railway Commissions have decided that the Grand Trunk Railway must build a subway about 300 feet east of the present crossing on the Lake Shore road.

KINGSTON, ONT.—Plans are being prepared for additions to Collegiate Institute at a cost of \$1,400.—The Yacht Club will be asked to endorse the scheme for the O'Kill street sewer by-law.

GALT, ONT.—F. E. Brown, acting for the Power & Gas Machine Co., Ltd., capital \$100,000, has purchased a site at the head of Hopeton street on which a large new factory will be built, of cement blocks.

STURGEON FALLS, ONT.—Councillor Mageau advocated the town installing a pumping plant for the waterworks system and to use the \$15,000 of debentures for pumping plant, the present service being unsatisfactory.

ST. CATHARINES, ONT.—The Hamilton Cataract Power, Light & Traction Co. will spend a considerable sum for the distribution of electric light and power throughout the city.—The Council may shortly take tenders on sewer pipe.

EDMONTON, N.W.T.—J. H. Hargreaves, City Engineer, wants tenders by 20th inst. for the construction of about three miles of pipe sewers.—G. J. Kinnaid is inviting tenders up to July 20th for the labor required in the construction of about three miles of pipe sewers.

ST. THOMAS, ONT.—The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, desires tenders by Friday, 21st inst., for alteration, etc., to public building in this city. Plans on application to G. Lyon.—J. L. Huggan will erect a brick residence.

GLACE BAY, N. S.—The following are the tenders received for the extension of water system: A. McAsk 1, \$8,238; H. Cameron, \$8,000; R. S. Low, \$8,018; Dixon & Falconer, \$10,124. Contracts will not likely be awarded until the next meeting of the Council.

FORT FRANCES, ONT.—A syndicate is being formed to build a large new hotel on the corner of Church and Front streets.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce will build a brick block on north side of Church and Mowat streets. Plans for same are being prepared at the head office, Toronto.

VICTORIA, B. C.—A by-law to provide \$11,000 to enlarge the electric light plant will shortly be submitted to the ratepayers. The proposed improvements include a new dynamo and 150 arc lamps.—The by-law to raise \$30,000 for school buildings will come before the ratepayers on July 21st.
