MATLAND'S VESSELS YESTERDAY.—One of those interesting scenes which often take place on a distant village occurred yesterday. It was a beautiful morning. The sun shone in a cloudless sky, with all the subdued strength of an October day. Far down, two lines of smoke indicated the approach of two steamships from St. John, running up with the rapidly-rising tide. As they neared the village, the "Snow Queen," a magnificent ship of a thousand tons, spread all her canvases, swung into the stream, and moved off under the splashing breeze down the river, presenting a splendid marine picture. As soon as she passed out of the way, the workmen of Mr. McDonald's shipyard, who had knocked out the wedges, and the fine ship "Algonia," of 1200 tons burden, left her berth, and moved into the river, speeding a quarter of a mile before the force was lost, and she was launched with a splash. One of the tugs then seized her, and carried her off; following in the wake of the "Snow Queen."

While the "Algonia" was being launched at the village, five miles higher up a similar process was being performed at the shipyard of Mr. John Trahey, on the beautiful barque "Annie Lowry," of 750 tons burden, the second tug immediately taking hold and carrying her down the stream after the other two.

The "Snow Queen" was built by Messrs. Frazar & Co., for Messrs. J. & E. Kenny and the builder.

The "Algonia" was built by Mr. Archibald McCallum, for Messrs. John Northup & Sons, of Fred. Curry, and the builder.

The "Annie Lowry" was built by Mr. John Trahey, for Capt. Lowry and brother.

These three vessels, which thus passed from the cradle on the shipyard to the water, are worth \$140,000. They are all classed 8 years in French Lloyd's, and in four weeks' time three or four other fine and large vessels will be launched.

EMIGRANTS.—Among the passengers per "Hibernian" on Saturday evening were 48 in the steerage, of whom 35 were immigrants never having been on this side of the water before. Of these 22 will settle in the Province, and the other 12 proceed to New Brunswick this morning. The nationality of these immigrants is as follows:—22 English, 8 Scotch, 3 Swedish and 1 Irish. Most of them are women and children who have come out to join relatives who preceded them to this country, though there are a few farmers and mechanics among them.

The Newcastle, N. B., Advocate says: "Some days ago Matilda, daughter of Mr. Thos. Wheeler, aged about 14 years, trod on a rusty rake lying in the garden attached to her father's house, and wounded the sole of her foot. She complained during the week of not feeling well, lost her appetite and on Saturday symptoms of Tetanus (commonly known as lock-jaw) set in and she died on Monday morning last.

P. E. ISLAND.—Prince Edward Island is a little anxious about its exports of grain, potatoes, etc., this season. The crops have been late in ripening and the high freights offering for other kinds of business make it difficult to set ships to accept such freights as grains can afford to pay. As navigation closes early, the nature of the situation will at once be perceived.—Chron.

FRUIT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION.—Our Wolfville correspondent omitted to mention in his published account of the Exhibition that a conversation of the leading fruit growers was held in Temperance Hall on Wednesday evening, on the general subject of fruit growing, packing, and marketing. A statement was given by one of the speakers, Mr. A. Longley, is deserving of special notice. He estimated that there would be 60,000 barrels of apples raised in Annapolis County, which would represent a net value of \$100,000. It may be judged from this what an important branch of business fruit growing really is.—Chronicle.

SHIPPING DISASTER IN ST. JOHN HARBOUR.—The "SCUD" INQUIRY.—In St. John harbor, on Thursday afternoon about a quarter past five o'clock, the British barque "Ocean Child," the Norwegian barque "Colporteur," and the woodboat schooner "British Queen" broke apart for their fast at the wharf. The "British Queen," the tide at the time, owing to the freshet in the river, running very swiftly. The three vessels went down the stream very fast, and on their way they fouled with the Norwegian barque "Peabody" and the Nova Scotia schooner "W. D. Beckford." The little schooner, lying outside the "Peabody," was carried by force from her fast, and the four vessels went on with the stream, striking next against the iron ship "Birdston," carrying away her port bunks, knocking part of the gilt work from her stern and doing other damage. From the "Birdston" the four vessels went in a snarl against the steamer "Scud." The little schooner was forced down the steel sides of the beautiful langue overboard, drifted clear of the rest of the vessels, and was brought up by her anchors between Leice's Point and the ballast wharf, and was towed back again at midnight to the "Peabody."

The total loss is estimated at \$7,000. The "Empress" takes the "Scud's" place on the Bay.

A NOBLE INSTITUTION.—The New York Herald of Thursday says: "There is plentiful suggestion in the report of the British National Lifeboat Association, that during the last twenty months the institution has been instrumental in saving one thousand one hundred and sixty-five lives, besides saving property to the value of three hundred and thirty-seven vessels from destruction. There has been an association which can make a parallel declaration. We have a long coast, upon which, though wrecks may be less frequent than in the seas which great Britain, many lives are annually lost which a proper organization for rescue and preservation. Shall we permit our country across the water to lead us in the practical benevolence of assistance to those whose winds and waves threaten upon our shores?"

THE SPRING HILL RAILWAY.—The St. John Telegram, in referring to the proposed railway from Spring Hill to the Intercolonial, says:—"It will be about three and three quarters miles in length and will be ready for the acceptance, rails and ballast laid, and ready to be used, probably by the end of the month of November. The Dominion Government is to provide the superstructure, sleepers and rails. Some difficulty in obtaining new iron is anticipated, and the Government has agreed to purchase the iron at a rate to be had and will probably be used, so as to enable the company to get its iron to market in large quantities by the first of, or at the latest, the middle of December."
