Sad Death of Alex. Davison at Hamilton Removed a Highly Esteemed Citizen.

Death, at the family residence, 154 Dundurn street, Hamilton, on Thursday morning last, removed a well known and highly respected resident, in the person of Alfred Davison. The deceased was born in London, Eng., 52 years ago, and came to Brantford when a young boy.
