BRANT COUNTY CROPS

According to the agricultural re-
turns to hand, Brant County raised
last year 22,255 bushels of peas, 13-
845 bushels of beans, 310,492 bushels
of wheat, 76,984 bushels of corn for
silage, 1,428 bushels of potatoes,
9,993 carrots, 592,371 of mangold
wurtzels, 1,424,000 of turnips, quite a
goodly amount, and one which, per-
acre, is ahead of many neighboring
counties.

RUSSIANS ANXIOUS.

Many of the Russians resident in
the city are anxious to go to war,
and many have petitioned Mr. Stander
to see what can be done for them in
this regard. To this end, Mr. Stander
will leave for Montreal on Monday,
where he will interview the Russian
consul in order to arrange if possible
for the transportation of a number
of the anxious Russians. He will also
see what can be done for the relief of
a number of others.

cels to Private Willie McBride of
the R. F. A., Bedfordshire
Regiment, and to Mr. Robbins, 421
High Street, Plymouth, are asked to
call at the wicket for the purpose of
giving customs declarations and con-
necting the amount of stamps placed
on the parcels.

The latest reports concerning the
condition of Emperor William was
that he was unable to leave his bed,
and that his fever had not decreased.
There is no official confirmation,
however, of reports that the emperor
is suffering from pneumonia.

BANISH THE BAR

Saskatchewan Taking Up the
Question in a Non-Politi-
cal Way.

(By Special Wire to the Courier)

REGINA, Sask., Dec. 10.—As a re-
sult of the big banish the bar con-
vention, held here yesterday, it ap-
pears likely the temperance people in
Saskatchewan will definitely enter the
political arena to further objects they
have in view, that is, they will sub-
ject candidates of both parties to a
test of their temperance principles,
and where neither candidate answers
satisfactorily a temperance candidate
will be placed in the field.

A motion to change the "banish the
bar" campaign to a campaign of
straight prohibition was voted down
and the policy of "abolish the bar"
will be continued. Some warm de-
bates occurred on the attitude of the
government, some speakers adversely
criticizing its attitude to the temperance
question, while others held the
authorities were not warranted in go-
ing farther than they have already
done. A deputation of the executive
of the "banish the bar" committee will
be sent to the government to-day to re-
quest the government to curtail the
hours for sale of liquor and to grant
no new license in the province.

IT WAS MISTAKE

German Cruisers Might Have
Been Rounded Up
Sooner.

(By Special Wire to the Courier)

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 10.—Some
discussion has taken place both
here and in England regarding the
escape of the Scharnhorst and
Gneisenau in the early stages of the
war. It has been suggested that ac-
tivities were diverted from attempts
to capture these and other German
vessels in the Pacific with a view to
seizing Samoa and other German pos-
sessions, which could have been cap-
tured at any time.

Premier Massey, of New Zealand,
and Defence Minister Allen, both say
which is, of course, a fact, that the
whole operations were under the con-
trol of the Admiralty. They add
that while not wishing to depreciate
the value of the services of the Aus-
tralian navy, the New Zealand gov-
ernment did not attempt to expedite
in any way the seizure of Apia.
