A MATTER OF SURPRISE.

Politicians Did Not Believe That Senator Turner, Whose Term Expires March 4, Would Be Placed on Alaska Commission—Foster Is Counsel.

Washington, Feb. 16.—The selection of Senator Turner as a member of the Alaska commission causes some surprise, not because he does not possess eminent fitness as a jurist, but because he has been a vigorous opponent of the administration's politics. Some of the most distinguished Republican members of the senate, however, joined in recommending him. His term as senator expires March 4. In selecting him the president distinctly wished to recognize the claims of the Pacific northwest. The three commissioners will appoint their own agent or counsel under the terms of the treaty.
