IN TIMES OF WAR—PREPARE FOR PEACE

This admonition seems somewhat reversed but at this particular time it seems applicable to the village or town of Canning spending the last few summers. The natural beauty and advantages of the place are easily seen and when one is told that at one time Canning where the writer has tried, and the principal place in the County of Kings—one question—why this decline? The answers might be many.

Conditions have changed—the old days of shipbuilding and the coasting trade with the United States which made the village boom, has passed out, and the men and the forests of heavy timber that belonged to that time also. The men of today have not risen up to face the present conditions or measured up to their opportunities or responsibilities, as Guardians of the Past or Trustees of the Future.

In 1912 one-half the stores on the Main Street were destroyed by fire—and the cellars about 8 to 10 feet deep remain along the sidewalk as the fire left them—no protection to the citizen or the stranger and at night is very dangerous—and some accidents have occurred—but the lot owners disclaim the responsibility—the street commissioner says it is not in his jurisdiction and the 500 feet or more remains a menace. The cost of a rail protection would not be much. The people outside the village think their safety is not considered by the citizens or their trade valued by the merchants. The town is injured very much during the summer by its mail service and trade connection. Its telephone system is ten years behind the time—no place of its size in the Valley has its streets as poorly lighted. It boasts pure air and good water system and fair harbor. Government wharf and Armouries, steamship connection with St. John and Minas Basin ports and good school.

It is not incorporated—but forms a part of the municipality of Kings and sends two members to Council. A new Council is being selected now by the people for the next three years—can two be selected who will do more for the village than was done the last three years.

ENEMY'S GRIP LOOSENED.

The military situation on both the Roumanian fronts, on the Transylvanian frontier and in Dobrudja, continues to grow more favorable to the Allies. General Mackensen's troops have been stopped in their tracks while General Falkenhayn's grip on the gateway of northern Roumania is steadily being loosened.

In the face of violent snow storms and impenetrable fogs King Ferdinand's troops have smashed forward in two important sectors. The most notable success was obtained in the Jiu Valley where the Teutons have been steadily on the retreat for nearly a week. In a brilliant assault the Roumanians finally succeeded in clearing Szuduk Pass entirely of the enemy driving them back across the frontier into Transylvania. Hundreds of prisoners were taken in this operation and, even more important to the ill-equipped soldiers of King Ferdinand guns of all calibre and quantities of munitions were seized.

An aviation school will shortly be established in Canada by the government, and in connection with this proposal arrangements will be made for the establishment of a factory for the construction of aeroplanes including the motors.
