

PROSECUTION HAS BEGUN

Lumber Dealers in Alberta Up Against the Law for Conspiracy in Restraint of Trade

Edmonton, Aug. 28.—Last night the 144 summonses were dispatched for service on the twelve defendants who are being prosecuted in connection with the alleged lumber combine. The defendants are the executive committee of the Alberta Retail Lumber Dealers' Association, numbering twelve, are as follows: P. A. Prince, Calgary; W. H. Clark, Edmonton; F. D. Becker, Calgary; A. M. Grogan, Calgary; F. W. Irvine, Vegreville; A. J. McDonald, Edmonton; A. J. Grosse, Wetaskiwin; D. C. Goutlay, Lacombe; William Dean, Oids; W. Stewart, Calgary; W. Barclay, Claresholm; J. D. McNicol, Lethbridge.

There are twelve charges against each defendant, each being charged with conspiracy, (1) with the other members of the executive of the Alberta Retail Lumber Dealers' Association, (2) with the Mountain Millers' Association of British Columbia, and (3) with the British Columbia Lumber and Shingle Association in contravention of each of the four headings, (a), (b), (c), and (d) of section 520 of the criminal code which reads as follows: "Everyone is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty not exceeding four thousand dollars, or not less than two hundred dollars, or to two years imprisonment, and if a corporation is liable to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars and not less than one thousand dollars, who conspires combines agrees or manages with any other person, or with any railway, steamship or transportation company unlawfully (a) To unduly limit the facilities for transporting, producing, manufacturing, supplying storing or delaying in any article in any article or commodity which may be a subject of trade or commerce or, (b) to restrain or injure trade or commerce in relation to any such article or commodity, or (c) to unduly prevent, limit or lessen the manufacture or production of any such article or commodity or to unduly enhance the price thereof, or (d) to unduly prevent or lessen competition in the production, manufacture, purchase, barrier, sale, transportation or supply of any article or commodity or in the price of insurance upon any person or property.

As each separate charge of conspiracy with each association in contravention of each separate heading of the section forms a distinct prosecution twelve summonses had to be served on each defendant. The number of summonses for each witness will be very large, a single witness requiring 144 summonses for himself. The witnesses to be called are members of the executive of the two western associations. By Dominion law they are bound to answer all questions, but in the event of their permission tending to incriminate themselves cannot be made basis of charges will be compelled by subpoenas which have been issued by Judge Scott. The expense of the prosecution will be very heavy even although the witnesses will be required to attend the preliminary hearing on 5th of September before Inspector Worstley at their own expense there being no provision for payment of expenses except at the final hearing before the Supreme Court. It is expected that the witnesses will be summoned today.

OLD RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

Mr. Crey, a Pioneer of the Regina District, dies at Winnipeg - Prominent Orangeman

S. Gray an old resident of this city died at Winnipeg on Friday last. Concerning the deceased the Free Press says: After an illness extending over some three months, Samuel Gray, a prominent Orangeman, passed away last night at his home, Sherbrooke street. Mr. Gray was born in the county of Peel, Ont., in 1847, and for nearly thirty years was a prominent member of the Orange order. Initiated into L.O.L. 604, Tullamore, in 1879, he moved to Cobok, North Victoria in '82 and became a member of the lodge there. In '97 he went to Ottawa, becoming a member and in the course was elected recording secretary. Mr. Gray was also elected secretary for the district lodge of Ottawa, which office he filled until his removal to Regina in 1891. Here he became a charter member upon the organization of an L.O.L. In 1893 Mr. Gray was elected Worshipful Master, and in the following year was re-elected to the same position. At the third meeting of the R.W. Grand Lodge of the N.W.T. he was elected R.W. Grand Secretary.

For twenty years Mr. Gray was an employe of the Dominion government first in the office of the minister of the interior at Ottawa, and afterwards in the Regina lands office. Later on Mr. Gray entered the service of the immigration department, and was engaged at Winnipeg. The deceased leaves a widow and two children. A son, M. E. Gray, is manager of the Northern Bank at Langham Sask., and a daughter is a nurse in training at the Winnipeg General hospital.

In Winnipeg Mr. Gray joined the Ulster Heroes, L.O.L. 1520 and the officers and members of this lodge will meet at the Scott Memorial hall and after opening the lodge will proceed to the residence on Sherbrook street and escort the body to St. John's cemetery.

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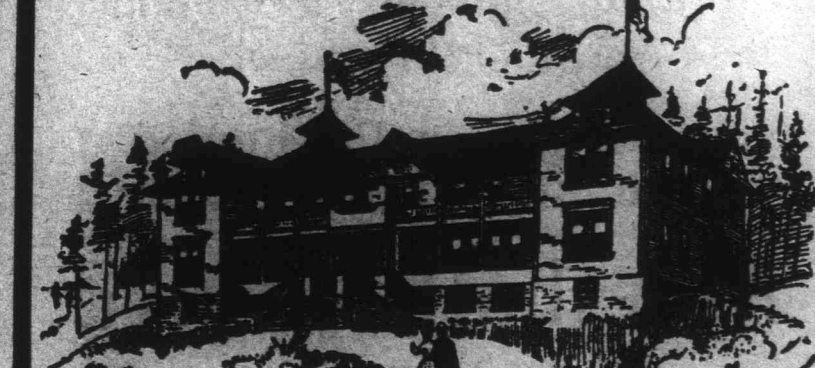
